Evening Devotion Outline

The whole Lord's Day is to be a day of worship and praise to God. This evening devotion is a great way to close out the Lord's Day by reflecting on God's word and works through Christ. Begin with reading the opening Scriptures. Pray the Lord's Prayer together and sing a Psalm or hymn. Have someone read the passage of Scripture (taken from the "first reading" of the morning service). Once you listen to the devotion, reflect with a few (or all) of the questions for reflection and close with singing and prayer.

All Scripture is quoted from the English Standard Version.

Opening ScripturePsalm 66:1–7

- ¹ Shout for joy to God, all the earth;
- 2 sing the glory of his name; give to him glorious praise!
- Say to God, "How awesome are your deeds!So great is your power that your enemies come cringing to you.
- 4 All the earth worships you and sings praises to you; they sing praises to your name." *Selah*
- 5 Come and see what God has done: he is awesome in his deeds toward the children of man.
- He turned the sea into dry land;
 they passed through the river on foot.
 There did we rejoice in him,
- 7 who rules by his might forever,
 whose eyes keep watch on the nations—
 let not the rebellious exalt themselves. Selah

Confession of Faith:.....Westminster Shorter Catechism, Qs. 7–11

Q. 7. What are the decrees of God?

A. The decrees of God are his eternal purpose, according to the counsel of his will, whereby, for his own glory, he hath foreordained whatsoever comes to pass.

Q. 8. *How doth God execute his decrees?* A. God executeth his decrees in the works of creation and providence.

Q. 9. What is the work of creation?

A. The work of creation is God's making all things of nothing, by the word of his power, in the space of six days, and all very good.

Q. 10. How did God create man?

A. God created man male and female, after his own image, in knowledge, righteousness and holiness, with dominion over the creatures.

Q. 11. What are God's works of providence?

A. God's works of providence are his most holy, wise and powerful preserving and governing all his creatures, and all their actions.
