WEN WAS BIBLICAL, and depended just as much on the Holy Spirit. He certainly believed in a learned ministry - after all, he had taught theology at Oxford and done his best to promote godliness within the student body. But he also trusted the Holy Spirit to guide ordinary Christians in small group Bible studies that did not need to be policed by a formally trained expert. Aside from his own Bible study, which advanced on the serious scholarship represented by the three thousand titles that were included in the catalog of his library published soon after his death, Owen encouraged church members to study Scripture in private.

For a moment, let's back up to Owen's conversion. Though he embraced Puritan convictions from his youth, Owen lacked personal assurance of faith until, in 1642, he attended a church service at St. Mary Aldermanbury, London. He expected to hear Edmund Calamy preach, but a substitute was in the pulpit. Owen's friend urged him to leave with him to hear a more famous minister some distance away, but Owen decided to stay. The substitute preacher chose as his text, "Why are ve fearful, O ve of little faith?" God used that sermon to bring Owen to assurance of faith. Later, Owen tried in vain to learn the identity of the preacher.

Owen took the Solemn League and Covenant at Fordham where he also took Mary Rooke as his bride. Of the eleven children born to them, only a daughter survived into adulthood. After an unhappy marriage to a Welshman, the daughter returned to live with her parents. She died of consumption shortly afterwards.

Richard Baxter claims that at the death of Cromwell Owen joined the Wallingford House party. Though supported by the fact that under the Restoration he had among his congregation a large number of these officers, Owen himself utterly denied this. He appears, however, to have assisted in the restoration of the Rump Parliament, and, when George Monck, 1st Duke of Albemarle, began his march into England, Owen, in the name of the Independent churches, to whom Monck was supposed to belong, and who were keenly anxious as to his intentions, wrote to dissuade him from the enterprise.

In March 1660, the Presbyterian party deprived Owen of his deanery at Oxford and gave it back to Edward Reynolds. Owen then retired to Stadham, where he wrote various controversial and theological works, in especial the laborious Theologoumena Pantodapa, a history of the rise and progress of theology. In 1661 was published the celebrated Fiat Lux, a work in which the oneness and beauty of Roman Catholicism are contrasted with the confusion and multiplicity of Protestant sects. At Clarendon's request Owen answered this in 1662 in his Animadversions; and this led of course to a prolonged controversy. Glarendon now offered Owen perferment if he would conform. Owen's condition for making terms was liberty to all who agree in doctrine with the Church of England; nothing therefore came of the negotiation.
