      - c. Those who reject God's message are not true children of Abraham. 3:7 Ga. 3:7

  - 4. You can never please some people because their problem is not with the messenger, but with the message. 1 Sam. 8:7
  - 5. God uses different kinds of men and ministries to convey His message.
  - 6. Good men and their message may be rejected by the majority.
  - 7. Jesus is still a friend of sinners. v. 34b 5:30-32
- C. True wisdom is vindicated (justified) by its outcome. v. 35 Mt. 11:19
  - 1. Jesus and John are vindicated in spite of the rejection of the Jewish leaders. 2:40
  - 2. Wisdom's children heed God's purpose as conveyed through John and Jesus.
  - 3. There is no-one else for whom we should look. v. 19
