- I. When Our Perceptions Do Not Reflect Our Reality (19-21)
 - A. What's in a name?
 - 1. Naomi "pleasant"
 - 2. Mara "bitter"
 - a. Perhaps it was the ling absence (10 years)
 - b. Perhaps it was the sufferings endured
 - c. Perhaps it was the sadness of spirit
 - d. Perhaps it was all of the above
 - e. The people were uncertain of it being Naomi
 - B. The pain of a difficult providence
 - 1. The Almighty is against me
 - 2. Went out full, come back empty
 - 3. Our actions impact everyone in the community
- II. At The Beginning of the Barley Harvest (22)
 - A. The timing is of great significance
 - 1. Most date the beginning of barley harvest to coincide (more or less) with the timing of Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread
 - Passover celebration of God's deliverance of the Israelites from the 10th plague through the substitutionary sacrifice of a lamb

- 3. Feast of Unleavened Bread essentially a continuation of the Passover: it brought about the remembrance of the Israelites affliction as the fled Egypt in haste after the plagues. It lasted one week, with special offerings on each day. The second day a included the first harvest of barley as a wave offering
- B. Why This Matters
 - 1. The people's mind's would have been oriented toward God's great power in both judgment and deliverance
 - 2. The people's mind's would have been focused on the sacrificial nature of God's salvation
 - 3. The people's minds would have been aware of their need to abide in the covenant promises
- C. Joy and hope are not really about present circumstances; joy and hope are about a constant remembrance that God is faithful to keep His Word
