### 1. How We Are to Pray (v 11a)

- **A.** We are to pray with understanding *Therefore* 
  - **1)** Larger Catechism 178, *What is prayer?* 'Prayer is an offering up of our desires unto God, in the name of Christ, by the help of his Spirit; with confession of our sins, and thankful acknowledgment of his mercies.'
  - 2) To Whom we pray To God alone, our Father in heaven
  - 3) Through Whom we pray Through the mediation of Christ our Great High Priest
  - **4)** By Whom we pray By the power and instruction of the Holy Spirit
  - **5)** Our need of prayer *Therefore* (1:3, 5, 8, 10)
- **B.** We are to pray privately and publicly we also pray
  - **1)** Private prayer (Mt 6:6)
  - 2) Public prayer: Family (Psa 118:15); Friends (Jms 5:16); Church (1 Tim 2:1)
- C. We are to pray without ceasing always (1 Thes 5:17)
  - 1) Pray with regularity (Psa 55:17)
  - 2) Pray with spontaneity (Neh 2:4)
  - 3) Pray with longevity (Lk 18:1)
- **D.** We are to pray not only for ourselves, but also for others
- **E.** Further Use from the Text: Pray with faith (Lk 11:9-13)

# 11. What We Are to Pray (v 11b)

- A. That our God would count you worthy of this calling
  - **1)** Exposition: That is, that you would (a) Persevere individually through your present sufferings (2 Thes 1:4-5); and, (b) Persevere corporately in faith and godliness (Eph 4:1-3)
  - 2) Correlation to the Lord's Prayer: Hallowed be Thy name . . . And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us
  - 3) Uses from the Point
    - **a)** We should have the mindset of desiring to finish the race together.
    - **b)** Look to the promises of God (2 Pt 1:4)
- **B.** And fulfill all the good pleasure of His goodness —

- **1)** Exposition: That God would do all of His Will, which is all good and all of grace
  - **a)** By which we are elected and saved (Eph 1:5-6)
  - **b)** Because of which the Son took the form of a servant (Lk 2:13-14)
  - c) By which we walk according to our calling (Phil 2:12b-13)
- 2) Correlation to the Lord's Prayer: Thy Kingdom come (WSC 102); Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven (WSC 103)
- 3) Use from the Point: Meditate and delight in the goodness of God (I Jn 3:1a)
- C. And fulfill . . . the work of faith
  - **1)** Exposition
  - 2) Correlation to the Lord's Prayer: Give us this day our daily bread . . . And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil
  - 3) Uses from the Point Self-examination: How are you growing in faith? How do you desire to grow further in the faith?
- **D.** Further Uses from the Text
  - **1)** We are to grow in our prayers
    - **a)** Learning from the Scriptures (Lk 11:1-2a; Mt 6:9a; Rom 11:33-36; Dan 9:7a, 9-11a; Jonah 2:1-2, 9; Mk 9:24)
    - **b)** Learning from the Saints (2 Tim 4:13)
  - 2) Respond to the Word with prayer.
  - **3)** Pursue these matters of prayer with action.

## 111. Why We Are to Pray (v 12).

- **A.** The purpose of this prayer:
  - 1) That the name of our Lord Jesus Christ may be glorified in you
    - **a)** As in the conclusion of the Lord's Prayer For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever (Heid. Cat. 128)
    - **b)** All things are for the glory of God
  - **2)** And you in Him (Psa 8:4-5)
- **B.** The grounds of our praying:
  - **1)** With power
  - 2) According to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ (Rom 9:23; Heidelberg Catechism 120)
  - **3)** To this inspired example of prayer we must conclude, *Amen* (Heidelberg Catechism 129)
