Mark 8:27-33

Christ Must Suffer

Proposition: Christ must suffer, die, and rise to secure the Kingdom.

- I. The Great Confession: Jesus is Christ the King. (vv. 27-30)
 - a. Question 1: "Who do people say that I am?" (vv. 27, 28)
 - i. Answer 1: If Jesus is a mere prophet, then he isn't the Christ.
 - 1. Objection: Classifying Jesus among the prophets is *not high praise but rather base slander*.
 - 2. Objection: Classing Jesus as forerunner *shows low expectations* and misunderstandings of the kingdom.
 - ii. Inference 1: If Jesus is not the Christ, no king is coming.
 - 1. Objection: Surrendering Jesus as Christ is to *surrender to sin*, *Satan*, *and Death*.
 - 2. Objection: Rejecting Jesus as Christ is a *rejection of God himself* by asserting that his promises have failed.
 - b. Question 2: "But who do you say that I am?" (v. 29)
 - i. *Answer 2:* If Jesus precedes, exceeds, and fulfills the prophets, then *he is the Christ.*
 - 1. Proof: As Son of God, Jesus precedes the prophets.
 - a. His person precedes them. (Ps. 2:7; Jn. 1:30; 8:58)
 - b. His work precedes them. (Pr. 8:22ff; Jn. 1:3; Jd. 1:5)
 - 2. Proof: As Son of Man, Jesus exceeds the prophets.
 - a. His person exceeds them. (Mk. 1:7; Jn. 1:30)
 - b. His work exceeds them. (cf. Mk. 6:30-44; 8:1-9)
 - 3. Proof: As God-Man, Jesus fulfills the prophets. (Mk. 9:1-13)
 - a. His *person fulfills* them. (Dt. 18:15; Ac. 7:35-37)
 - b. His work fulfills them. (Lk. 24:27; cf. Ps. 2:7)
 - ii. Inference 2: If Jesus is the Christ, then he is the promised King.
 - 1. Proof: Anointing, not by man, but from God. (1 Sa. 2:10)
 - 2. Proof: Reigning, not by might, but upheld by God. (Is. 42:1ff)
 - 3. Proof: Building, not an earthly, but a heavenly temple. (vv. 27ff)
- II. The Great Confusion: Christ the King Must Suffer. (vv. 30-33)
 - a. Assertion: If Jesus would be King, then he *must* suffer, be rejected, be killed, and rise again. (vv. 31, 32a)
 - i. Suffering for sin to save us. (1 Pt. 3:18; cf. Zc. 9:9; Ro. 3:26)
 - ii. Being rejected so that we are to be accepted. (Is. 53:12; Ga. 3:13)
 - iii. Dying to sin so that we might live to God. (Zc. 13:7; Ro. 6:9, 10)
 - iv. Rising again so that he might reign forever. (Is. 53:10ff; cf. Lk. 7:35)
 - b. Objection: "Christ must not suffer, be rejected, killed, rise." (v. 32, 33)
 - i. Rationale: "The Kingdom of God isn't worth it."

- 1. "Just settle for an earthly kingdom."
- 2. "Why not *forget* about sin?"
- 3. "What about us?"
- 4. "But you'll die!"
- 5. "It *won't* work."
- ii. Rebuke: "The Kingdom of God is worth it!"
 - 1. For the sake of the *Church*. (Lk. 12:32; 18:7; Ep. 1:4, 5)
 - 2. For the defeat of the *enemy*. (Ge. 3:15; Rv. 12:17)
 - 3. For the glory of *God*. (Ez. 36:23; Is. 5:16)
- c. Conclusion: Christ has done this and thus has begun to reign. (v. 31)

III. Concluding Applications

- a. First, hold fast the Great Confession: Jesus is the Christ.
 - i. On this Great Confession, the Church stands or falls.
 - 1. Churches that deny Jesus is God incarnate deny Jesus is Christ.
 - 2. Churches that rank mere men with the Jesus deny He is Christ.
 - ii. On this Great Confession, every saint stands or falls.
 - 1. If we say God's promises have failed, we reject Christ's work.
 - 2. If we surrender to temptations, we surrender our hope in Christ
 - iii. On this Great Confession, all our worship stands or falls.
 - 1. Without Jesus, no Christ, and thus no access to God.
 - 2. Without Jesus, *no Savior*, and thus *no interest* in Grace.
 - 3. Without Jesus, *no King*, and thus *no part* in the Kingdom.
- b. **Second**, avoid the Great Confusion: *The King must suffer*.
 - i. Christ suffered to secure his Kingdom.
 - 1. Rejoice! The Church's sins are atoned and set aside.
 - 2. Glorify! Christ defeated his enemies and put them to shame.
 - ii. Christ suffered to fulfill all righteousness.
 - 1. Rest! The *Law of God* is satisfied.
 - 2. Press on! The promises of God cannot fail.
- c. Third, receive the Lord's rebuke: Get behind me Satan.
 - i. Fear to heap more sin on the 'must' of Christ's suffering.
 - ii. Beware of casting doubt on the cross' efficacy—this is the work of the enemy.
- iii. *Be unafraid* to join the Church in following Christ into the Kingdom on the *Via Dolorosa*.
