John Owen on the use of doctrines other than the Bible:

"The Holy Spirit hath not in the Scripture reduced and disposed its doctrines or supernatural truths into any system, order, or method."

"Truths have their power and efficacy upon our minds, not only from themselves, but from their posture in the Scripture."

"...no man will make choice of a counsellor <u>all</u> whose wisdom consists in sayings and rules cast into a certain order and method. He alone is a good counsellor who, out of the largeness and wisdom of his own heart and mind, can give advice according unto all present occasions and circumstances. Such counsellors are the testimonies of God. Artificial methodizing of spiritual truths may make men ready in notions, cunning and subtile in disputations; but it is the Scripture itself that is able to "make us wise unto salvation."

"In the writing and composing of the holy Scripture, the Spirit of God had respect unto the various states and conditions of the church...If all divine truths had from the first been stated and fixed in a system of doctrines, the state of the church must have been always the same; which was contrary unto the whole design of divine wisdom in those things."

[There are some things we would like to keep the same throughout history. The Bible, Catechisms and Confessions are some of these]

"Such a systematical proposal of doctrines, truths, or articles of faith, as some require, would not have answered the great ends of the Scripture itself. All that can be supposed of benefit thereby is only that it would lead us more easily into a methodical comprehension of the truths so proposed; but this we may attain, and not be rendered one jot more like unto God thereby...The principal end of the Scripture is of another nature. It is, to beget in the minds of men faith, fear, obedience, and reverence of God,—to make them holy and righteous; and those such as have in themselves various weaknesses, temptations, and inclinations unto the contrary, which must be

obviated and subdued. Unto this end every truth is disposed of in the Scripture as it ought to be."

Question 7. What are the decrees of God?

Answer: The decrees of God are his <u>eternal</u> <u>purpose</u> according to the counsel of his will, whereby, for his own glory, he hath foreordained whatsoever comes to pass.

Psalm 33:11 (KJV)

The counsel of the LORD standeth for ever, the thoughts of his heart to all generations.

From Chapter III of the Westminster Confession:

- 3. By the decree of God, for the manifestation of his glory, some men and angels are predestinated unto <u>everlasting life</u>, and others foreordained to <u>everlasting death</u>.
- 4. These angels and men, thus predestinated and foreordained, are <u>particularly and unchangeably designed</u>; and their number is so certain and definite that it cannot be either increased or diminished.

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- 5. Those of mankind that are predestinated unto life, God, before the foundation of the world was laid, according to his eternal and immutable purpose, and the secret counsel and good pleasure of his will, hath chosen in Christ, unto everlasting glory, out of his mere free grace and love, without any foresight of faith or good works, or perseverance in either of them, or any other thing in the creature, as conditions, or causes moving him thereunto; and all to the praise of his glorious grace.
- 6. As God hath appointed the elect unto glory, so hath he, by the eternal and most free purpose of his will, <u>fore-ordained all the means thereunto</u>. Wherefore they who are elected, being fallen in Adam, are redeemed by Christ, are effectually called unto faith in Christ by his Spirit working in due season; are justified, adopted, sanctified, and kept by his power through faith unto salvation. Neither are any other redeemed by Christ, effectually called, justified, adopted, sanctified, and saved, but the elect only.

Isaiah 14:24 (KJV)

The LORD of hosts hath sworn, saying, Surely as I have thought, so shall it come to pass; and as I have purposed, so shall it stand.

Acts 2:23 (KJV)

Him, being delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, ye have taken, and by wicked hands have crucified and slain.

Ephesians 1:11-12 (KJV)

In whom also we have obtained an inheritance, being predestinated according to the purpose of him who worketh <u>all things</u> after the counsel of his own will: 12 That we should be to the praise of his glory, who first trusted in Christ.

Question 8. How doth God execute his decrees? **Answer:** God executeth his decrees in the works of creation and providence.

Question 12: What special act of providence did God exercise toward man in the estate wherein he was created?

Answer: When God had created man, he entered into a covenant of life with him, upon condition of perfect obedience; forbidding him to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, upon pain of death.

noun

noun: **providence** the protective care of God or of nature as a spiritual power. [OED]

Providence as defined by Berkof:

"...that work of God in which He preserves all His creatures, is active in all that happens in the world, and directs all things to their appointed end."

From Berkof:

The Elements of Divine Providence. We distinguish three elements:

Divine preservation. This is that continuous work of God by which He upholds all things.

Divine concurrence. This may be defined as that work of God by which He cooperates with all His creatures and causes them to act precisely as they do.

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Divine government. This is the continued activity of God whereby He rules all things so that they answer to the purpose of their existence.

Misconceptions of Divine Providence:

The Deistic conception.

This is to the effect that God's concern with the world is of the most general nature. He created the world, established its laws, set it in motion, and then withdrew from it.

The Pantheistic conception.

Pantheism does not recognize the distinction between God and the world.
