Week #1 (Oct 7): The Need for and the Ability of Others (elders especially) to Help Pastors in Counseling

- 1. Pastors are not able to handle all the counseling needs in a church. Statistics in the PRC.
- 2. Elders are called to do this work, but are qualified for it, too. The congregation must learn this.
- 3. Scripture teaches that all the members have a "competency to counsel." If so, elders certainly do.
- 4. How, specifically, can the elders take on this work in their office?
 - a. Elderly, shut-ins, etc.
 - b. Counseling with the minister
 - c. Supervising the counseling done by professionals

Week #2 (Oct 14): The Elements of a Good Counseling Session/Visit

- 1. How to schedule meetings; how often to meet.
- 2. An outline of any visit should include.... How to make an agenda.
- 3. The absolute necessity of using Scripture. And how to use it.
- 4. Developing the skill to listen in order to make judgments. Taking notes....
- 5. Giving assignments to the members we counsel.
- 6. Footnote: May an elder counsel a woman? Alone?

Week #3 (Oct 21): Change in Counseling: The Primary (and Hopeful!) Doctrine of Conversion

- 1. Most of counseling involves dealing with problems that require change...
- 2. The doctrinal foundation of our approach to change.
- 3. Essential elements from LD 33.
- 4. Requiring change and growth, "more and more."
- 5. When to bring to the body of the elders for discipline?

- B. Then, these two elements of conversion are always in our minds:
 - 1. Conversion is a very painful activity: It's dying to myself. It's living to another.
 - 2. There must always be growth in all elements of this activity: It's "more and more." Required?
- II. Conversion should be taught in the context of the whole of Scripture. Never in Isolation from:
 - A. KNOWLEDGE OF OUR THREE-FOLD—MORTAL—ENEMY (fight without knowing the enemy?)
 - 1. The devil (key texts: II Tim 2:24,25; II Cor 2:11; II Cor 11:14,15; I Pet 5:8,9; Eph 6:12)
 - 2. The wicked world (key texts: Psalm 1 (!); Psalm 101; Il Cor 6:14-16; James 4:4; etc.)
 - 3. Our own sinful flesh (key texts: Psalm 51:5 → Psalter # 140,141; Rom 7:18!; etc.)
 - B. THE DOCTRINE OF JUSTIFICATION—the forgiveness of sins. Here is hope!!!
 - 1. Sanctification (or daily conversion) is always related to, and follows from, justification. And it DOES follow
 - 2. Key texts: Romans 12:1,2; II Cor 7:1.
 - 3. Applied to counseling:
 - a. There are many other motivating factors to turn from sin. This one must be predominant!
 - b. Let this truth lead in your calls to repentance, holiness, change: I am sorry for sin, I seek forgiveness, I am thankful to God for the free grace of His forgiveness of me.
 - c. And if we're justified by faith, think about I John 5:4!! Here is hope!!
 - C. THE NEED **I** HAVE FOR THE VERY SAME MEDICINE I BRING TO THE TROUBLED CHILD OF GOD
