

Law

1. The law, law, or Law, has various meanings throughout The Old and New Testaments. <u>Greek</u>: The Greek word for "law" is *nomos*. The English language does not always have the same formal equivalency and can have a variety of meanings depending on its context.

Law (nomos) can mean: (A) a particular or specific command that promises rewards for obedience or punishment for disobedience (Gal. 3:10); (B) a rule, principle, system, or norm (Rom. 3:27; 7:21); (C) a collection of writings, such as the Pentateuch (1 Cor. 9:8, 9; 14:21, 34; Gal. 3:10); or (D) a summary of the Old Testament (Matthew 5:17-21; Jn. 10:34; 12:34; 15:25; Rom. 3:21).

<u>Hebrew</u>: The Hebrew word for law is "Torah." Depending on the context, it is translated as "direction," "instruction," or "law" and is used 214 times in the Old Testament. The root word of Torah is *yara*, which means to "throw" or "shoot."

2. The law is viewed positively and negatively in Scripture.

Nomos occur 155 times in the New Testament.

Positively:

The "law" is of God (Rom. 7:7, 25; 8:7). It is "given by God" (Rom. 9:4) and "written by God" (1 Cor. 9:9; 14:21, 34). It contains "the will of God" (Rom. 2:17-18), "bears witness to the righteousness of God" (Rom. 3:21), and is "in accord with the promises of God" (Gal. 3:21). The law is "holy, good, and of the Spirit" (Rom. 7:12, 14, 16). Its essence is "love" (Rom. 13:8-10; Gal. 5:14), and its embodiment is "knowledge" and "truth" (Rom. 2:20). God brings knowledge of sin by utilizing the law, which exposes the sinfulness of sin (Rom. 7:7) and is a curse only to those who disobey it (Gal. 3:13).

Negatively:

- The law brings a curse (Gal. 3:13), wrath (Rom. 4:15), sin (Rom. 7:7), and death (Rom. 1:32; 5:12-21; 6:16, 21, 23; 7:5, 9-11, 13, 24; 2 Cor. 3:6-9; Col. 2:14).
- The law gives sin its "opportunity" and has the effect of multiplying sins (Rom 5:13, 20; 7:7-8). This increase has a quantitative dimension. Quantitatively, the law has increased the number of sins by defining more things that displease God by its very prohibition (Rom. 4:15; 5:13-14). The law gives sin its power (1 Cor. 15:56) and is used as an instrument of deception (Rom. 7:11). The law brings knowledge of sin (Rom. 3:19-20; 7:7-12).
- The law does not make men sinners but transgressors (Rom. 4:15; 5:13).

3. The law can have several genres.

Mosaic Law (covenant):

- Revealed to Moses and published for the nation of Israel on Mount Sinai through their prophet and intercessor, Moses. Initially, the Ten Words (Decalogue/Ten Commandments) were given (Ex. 34), and then subsequent revelation was provided, which Moses recorded afterward. Moses received significant instruction for the forty days and forty nights (Ex. 34:28) he spent on Mount Sinai.
- Only the nation of Israel received this law. As a result, it was only binding on them (Deut. 4:8; 5:1-3), as it was given in the context of slavery and to the inheritance of the land (Ex. 20:2, 12; Lev. 25:2; Deut. 28).
- The Mosaic law is known as the Torah, though not all the Torah is "law."
- The Mosaic law can be divided into five units: (1) The Ten Words (Ex. 20:1-17); (2) the book of the Covenant (Ex. 21-23), which reflects the customary law that would go into effect at that time; (3) the priestly regulations (Lev. 1-16); (4) the holiness regulations

(Lev. 17-27); and (5) the Deuteronomic regulations (Deut. 12-26). Beyond this, there are also regulations for the tabernacle and an account of its fabrication (Ex. 26-31; 35-40).

- The Mosaic law has 613 commandments. The Jewish tradition has 365 prohibitions (for each day of the year) and 248 commands (one for each body member).
- All the laws regulated their life as a nation, from food, cultic worship, a system of government, Sabbath polity, clothing, and relation to other Gentile nations.
- Dividing the Mosaic Law into a tripartite (moral, ceremonial, and civil) is unwise, confusing, unbiblical, and subjective.
 - Every Jew, including Jesus, viewed the Mosaic law as a unit, indivisible, since it is given within the context of a covenant.

<u>Positive Law</u>: commands, rules, and regulations that cannot be perceived by reason alone but only by verbal announcement or written publication. It becomes *binding* not because it reflects the essential character of God but because God, as the Creator, has revealed it.

• The prohibition from eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil (Gen. 2:17), circumcision (Gen. 17:10-14), Baptism (Acts 2:38), the Lord's Supper (1 Cor. 11:25), and various other clothing, food, and holiday observances communicated to the nation of Israel.

Natural Law:

- Derivative from the character of God and binding on all image-bearers at all times in all settings until sin and death are destroyed, and man will be unable to sin (non-posse peccare).
- Not acquired through tradition or formal instruction but intrinsic to man and not assessed, created, or implemented by popularity or majority vote.
- It is an imperfect guide for sinners because it can only be accessed by reason. Since reason cannot always be trusted because of sin, the DNA of natural law can be nearly obliterated in the unregenerate because the mind and intentions of the heart are perverted, obscured, and tainted by sin (Jer. 17:9-10; Rom. 1:21; 2 Tim. 3:13).
- In its essence, love toward God and love towards man.
- It is only because of sin that iterations of natural law are needed, though God holds man accountable for breaking the natural law.
- God holds *all* mankind accountable to natural law, *not* the Mosaic law.
- Inscribed on the hearts of the Gentiles, though without the Mosaic law (Rom. 1:32; 2:17-19; 3:19), they are still accountable to God for sinning against the law.
 - The pagan nations were removed from the land of Canaan because they violated natural law, not the Mosaic law since it wasn't published yet.
 - These nations were "unclean" because they practiced sorcery and divination and engaged in sexual perversion, including incest, bestiality, same-sex activity, adultery (Lev. 18:22-26) and sacrificed their children to Molech (Lev. 18:3).
- Adam and Eve, in their Pre-Fall condition, were able to sin (posse peccare) or able not to sin (posse non peccare).
 - There is no indication that God "published or communicated" to or with Adam any law, except one prohibition with a threat pre-Fall (Gen. 2:17).
- The Mosaic law is a publication and iteration of the natural law that is culturally tempered to Israel as a nation, based on its historical-redemptive setting. The Mosaic law (covenant) shares a similar substance to natural law, though different in form. It describes natural law; it does not define it. It shares the same substance but a different form.
- The law is not intended for the righteous, but the unrighteous (1 Tim. 4:9).
