# **Stewards of Life**

"You shall not murder."

1. (	God	<b>Prohibits</b>	Wrongful	Taking	of Human	Life.
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2. **God Holds Us Responsible** for the Lives of Our Neighbors.

3. Christ Was Murdered to Give Us Eternal Life.

CONCLUSION: God alone is the Giver of Human Life. He has made us uniquely in His image and sustains us with life and health for all the days that He has ordained for us. This means that taking human life wrongly is an assault not just on a human being, but directly on the One we represent. Knowing this, we should be advocates for one another, cultivating and encouraging human life. Christ's vicarious death for us is the source of our eternal life in His resurrection. Let us rejoice and encourage one another to live the abundant life He has acquired for us!

# Westminster Larger Catechism

### **Q.** 135. What are the **duties** required in the sixth commandment?

**A.** The duties required in the sixth commandment are, all careful studies, and lawful endeavors, to *preserve the life of ourselves and others* by resisting all thoughts and purposes, subduing all passions, and avoiding all occasions, temptations, and practices, which tend to the unjust taking away the life of any; by just defense thereof against violence, patient bearing of the hand of God, quietness of mind, cheerfulness of spirit; a sober use of meat, drink, physic, sleep, labor, and recreation; by charitable thoughts, love, compassion, meekness, gentleness, kindness; peaceable, mild, and courteous speeches and behavior: forbearance, readiness to be reconciled, patient bearing and forgiving of injuries, and requiting good for evil; comforting and succoring the distressed, and protecting and defending the innocent.

#### **Q.** 136. What are the **sins forbidden** in the sixth commandment?

**A.** The sins forbidden in the sixth commandment are, all taking away the life of ourselves, or of others, except in case of public justice, lawful war, or necessary defense; the neglecting or withdrawing the lawful and necessary means of preservation of life; sinful anger, hatred, envy, desire of revenge; all excessive passions, distracting cares; immoderate use of meat, drink, labor, and recreations; provoking words; oppression, quarreling, striking, wounding, and whatsoever else tends to the destruction of the life of any.

### **Sunday Morning**

READ Exodus 20:13; Genesis 4:8-16; Hebrews 12:18-24; Matthew 5:21-26; 18:15-20; First John 4:13-21; Psalm 119:65-80. DISCUSS What does God's prohibition against murder include? Why are we responsible for our neighbors' lives? How are you trusting Christ to love others as we should? MEDITATE on First John 4:7-8 with WLC #135-6. PRAY "Giver of Life, free us from our hatred and bitterness. Enable us to love others as You have loved us!"

### **Monday**

READ Exodus 20:13; Genesis 4:8-16; Isaiah 26:20-21; Hebrews 12:18-24; Psalm 119: 65-80. DISCUSS What does the Bible mean that the blood cries out? If Abel's blood cried for justice, for what does Christ's blood cry? SERVE by taking time to help someone! MEDITATE on First John 4:7-8 with WLC #135-6. PRAY, "Giver of Life, we have not loved as we should. Forgive us by the blood of Christ!"

### **Tuesday**

READ Exodus 20:13; Matthew 23:29-36; Revelation 6:9-11; Hebrews 12:18-24; Psalm 119: 65-80. DISCUSS How does Christ's blood cry out for forgiveness? Has Christ's shed blood covered you? How do you know? MEDITATE on **First John 4:7-8** with WLC #135-6. PRAY, "Giver of Life, You alone are the Living God. Enable us to encourage and cultivate life instead of death."

#### Wednesday

READ Exodus 20:13; Matthew 5:21-26; 18:15-20; Psalm 119:65-80. DISCUSS Who is responsible to initiate reconciliation between two parties? Why do we need both these passages in Matthew to answer that? MEDITATE on **First John 4:7-8** with WLC #135-6. PRAY, "Giver of Life, enable us to forgive and receive forgiveness with one another."

### **Thursday**

READ Exodus 20:13; First John 4:13-21; Psalm 119:65-80. DISCUSS What is the relationship between loving God and loving one another? Why? SERVE by putting someone else's interests *above your own!* MEDITATE on First John 4:7-8 with WLC #135-6. PRAY, "Giver of Life, enable us to honor Your established authorities even as Christ did Pilate as governor. Teach us to trust You in all of life because of Jesus."

#### **Friday**

READ Exodus 20:13; Genesis 4:8-16; Hebrews 12:18-24; Matthew 5:21-26; 18:15-20; First John 4:13-21; Psalm 119:65-80. DISCUSS What has God been teaching you this week? SERVE by *caring for someone in need!* MEDITATE on First John 4:7-8 with WLC #135-6. PRAY that we at FCCW would *honor Christ together*.

### **Saturday**

PREPARE today for gathered Sunday worship tomorrow. READ **Exodus 20:1-21**. Invite others to join you tomorrow for the worship service @ 10:30 am. PRAY, "Giver of Life, gather us together tomorrow to praise Your holy name and to delight in Your goodness."

# 1 John 4:7-8

"Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love."
