Reading of God's Word

Genesis 12.10-20

¹⁰ Now there was a famine in the land. So Abram went down to Egypt to sojourn there, for the famine was severe in the land. ¹¹ When he was about to enter Egypt, he said to Sarai his wife, "I know that you are a woman beautiful in appearance, ¹² and when the Egyptians see you, they will say, 'This is his wife.' Then they will kill me, but they will let you live. ¹³ Say you are my sister, that it may go well with me because of you, and that my life may be spared for your sake." ¹⁴ When Abram entered Egypt, the Egyptians saw that the woman was very beautiful. ¹⁵ And when the princes of Pharaoh saw her, they praised her to Pharaoh. And the woman was taken into Pharaoh's house. ¹⁶ And for her sake he dealt well with Abram; and he had sheep, oxen, male donkeys, male servants, female servants, female donkeys, and camels. ¹² But the Lord afflicted Pharaoh and his house with great plagues because of Sarai, Abram's wife. ¹⁸ So Pharaoh called Abram and said, "What is this you have done to me? Why did you not tell me that she was your wife? ¹⁹ Why did you say, 'She is my sister,' so that I took her for my wife? Now then, here is your wife; take her, and go." ²⁰ And Pharaoh gave men orders concerning him, and they sent him away with his wife and all that he had.

Celebrity sins...

- Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, and Feinstein
 - Cancel culture is all the rage today
- Abraham and Sarah... Should they be canceled?
 - o Slave owner, exploiter, colonialist, liar...
 - Let's look at their story....

What happened

- Famine in the land (archeology confirms)
 - Abraham and Sarah go to Egypt
- Failure to trust God and believe his promises
 - o Really what sin is: not trusting God has our best in mind
- Lie/half-truth
 - Sarah is Abraham's half-sister
 - Hurrian culture: honors the sister
- Exploited his wife
 - Put her at risk
 - Sarah complicit: stays quiet
- Secret discovered
- Witness compromised: failure to be a blessing to the nations
- Acquired Hagar as a slave
 - o Later, illicit relationship
 - o Sarah complicit again

When our Heroes sin

- Abraham and Sarah: the good, the bad, and the ugly
- Discouraging

Our reaction

- Hysterical
 - Expecting/demanding perfection
 - Hypocrisy: finding the speck in the eyes of others and ignoring our own logs
 - What makes us think we are so perfect?
 - o Astounding arrogance of the cancel culture

Historical

- Writing in the late 1800's, J. C. Ryle, in the foreword of his brief biography of George Whitefield, who was involved in slavery, cautions us on how we should view Christians of the past. "The story of Whitefield's times is one that should often be told. Without it, nobody is qualified to form an opinion either as to the man or his acts. Conduct that in one kind of times may seem rash, extravagant, and indiscreet, in another may be wise, prudent, and even absolutely necessary. In forming your opinion of the comparative merits of Christian men, never forget the old rule: 'Distinguish between times.' Place yourself in each man's position. Do not judge what was a right course of action in other times, by what seems a right course of action in your own."
- People are product of their own times
- Should we convict the people of the past that do not fit today's demands?

Record of sin

- Does God cancel Abraham and Sarah?
- <u>Jesus doesn't cancel sinners who repent and trust in him. Jesus doesn't cancel sinners like George Whitefield:</u> he cancels their sin.
- Samuel Sey, commenting on the University of Pennsylvania removing George Whitefield's statue: "Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven, and whose sins are covered; blessed is the man against whom the Lord will not count his sin." (Romans 4:7-8) That's why Jesus doesn't cancel sinners like George Whitefield. That's why Jesus doesn't cancel adulterers and murderers like King David. That's why Jesus doesn't cancel sinners like me. Jesus isn't embarrassed by any sinner. He isn't embarrassed by racists, adulterers, or murderers who believe in him. Jesus isn't embarrassed to call himself the Son of David. He isn't embarrassed to call himself the descendent of an adulterer and a murderer. That's the gospel George Whitefield preached. So, although his presence may not be welcomed anymore by sinners at the University of Pennsylvania, that's okay—his presence is welcomed forever by his sinless savior in heaven. Cancel culture says some sinners' names should be blotted out of history books. However, Christian culture—the gospel—says some sinners' names are inked by the blood of Jesus Christ in the book of life. This includes names of sinners like George Whitefield, King David, and Samuel Sey.
