BCE Supper Talk: October 29, 2022 "The Glorious Church"

Have you noticed? Being a dedicated member of a church is no longer a normal part of American culture. "Church people" stand out now more than ever before. Of course, standing out can be a very good thing, but in some ways, it makes being a member of a church more difficult. The culture no longer supports us or the time we commit to church activities, because it no longer sees church as a meaningful, important part of life.

On October 29, the Board of Christian Education invites you to a supper talk that intends to rekindle our love of church. We've titled it, "The Glorious Church." 2. We Must Rejoice Together!

3. We Must Rejoice in All Situations!

CONCLUSION: The Holy Spirit through the Apostle Paul commands us to rejoice in Christ and then he models that for us. In prison he rejoices for the indication of the Philippians' growth in grace and continued care for him. This rejoicing is the calling of all Christians. We are to rejoice in Christ together in all the situations in which our Loving Savior calls us. We can trust Him no matter what we see or hear or experience, because He has demonstrated His faithfulness to us.

Second Corinthians 12:7-10

⁸ Three times I pleaded with the Lord about this [thorn in the flesh], that it should leave me. ⁹ But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. ¹⁰ For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

Mark 12:41-44

⁴¹ And he sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the offering box. Many *rich* people put in large sums. ⁴² And a *poor* widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. ⁴³ And he called his disciples to him and said to them, "Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the offering box. ⁴⁴ For they all contributed *out of their abundance*, but she *out of her poverty* has put in everything she had, all she had to live on." (See also Luke 21:1-4.)

Matthew 14:13-21

¹³ Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a desolate place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When he went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them and healed their sick. ¹⁵ Now when it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a desolate place, and the day is now over; send the crowds away to go into the villages and buy food for themselves." ¹⁶ But Jesus said, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." ¹⁷ They said to him, "We have only five loaves here and two fish." ¹⁸ And he said, "Bring them here to me." ¹⁹ Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass, and taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and said a blessing. Then he broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. ²⁰ And they all ate and were *satisfied*. And they took up twelve baskets full of the broken *pieces left over* (abundance). ²¹ And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children. (See also Luke 9:10-17.)

First Timothy 6:6-10

⁶ But *godliness with contentment is great gain*, ⁷ for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. ⁸ But if we have food and clothing, *with these we will be content*. ⁹ But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰ For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs.

Taking Gathered Worship Home

Biblical *contentment* is not stoicism or indifference. It comes from rejoicing in Christ. It is a product of faith in our King who is in command of all our circumstances. We are freed to receive from Him all that He brings for our benefit, whether abundance or poverty, feasting or hunger, because we know that He is good and in control.

Please use the devotional material below each day this week to praise Christ. Ask Jesus to teach us His ways that we may walk in them to accomplish His purposes.

Sunday Morning

READ Philippians 4:10-12; 1 Peter 2:20-25; Second Corinthians 12:7-10; Mark 12:41-44; Matthew 14:13-21; First Timothy 6:6-10; Psalm 33:1-3. DISCUSS What are you doing to nuture biblical contentment in your life? How do your daily patterns or habits reflect this? How does God's sovereignty delight you? MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY "Jesus, enable us to be content in You."

Sunday Evening

Monday

READ Philippians 4:10-12; Second Corinthians 11:24-28; 12:7-10; Psalm 33:1-3. DISCUSS How was Paul able to be content? What enabled him to see these hardships as good? How do our circumstances testify to God's goodness? SERVE by putting someone else's interests *above your own*! MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY, "Lord, use whatever You will to conform us to Christ."

Tuesday

READ Philippians 4:10-12; Mark 12:41-44; 1 Peter 2:20-25; Psalm 81:1-2. DISCUSS How does Jesus use this contrast between abundance and poverty? Which is easier for you? Which makes you trust Christ more? MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY, "Jesus, we love comfort. Forgive us! Transform us to love You more. Make us more and more like You, so that we might be satisfied in You alone."

Wednesday

READ Philippians 4:10-12; Matthew 14:13-21; Psalm 90:13-17; 95:1-7. DISCUSS How does Christ use hunger and abundance here to teach us about contentment with Him? How do singing God's praises warm our hearts to this? MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY, "Lord, forgive us for being dissatisfied with You. Make our hearts delight in You above all else."

Thursday

READ Philippians 4:10-12; First Timothy 6:6-10; Psalm 92:1-4; Psalm 145:1-7. DISCUSS What is the relationship between godliness and contentment? What do they bring? How? MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY, "Lord, we long to have You make us as *godly in our lives* as You have *made us positionally on the cross.*"

Friday

READ Philippians 4:10-12; Second Corinthians 12:7-10; Mark 12:41-44; Matthew 14:13-21; First Timothy 6:6-10; Psalm 33:1-3. DISCUSS, What have you been learning from these passages? How has God been encouraging you in His Word this week? What do you need to change as a result? MEDITATE on Psalm 5:11. PRAY that we at FCCW would honor Christ in all that we think, say, and do.

Saturday

PREPARE today for the service tomorrow. READ **Philippians 4:1-23**. Invite others to join you tomorrow for Sunday School at 9:00 and the service @ 10:30. Ask Jesus to gather us together to praise Him joyfully.
