Prologue: Law Mirrors Sin Within

- Though Law reveals the hidden sin within, we perceive it as an enigma
- Sinful self does not desire to know one's inner sin
- Sinful self finds another use for the Law: Works



Prologue: Law Reveals Inner Sinner

- The sinful self one hides from the world and often even from one's self
- Through Law our sinful self stares back at us
- Scientism seeks to make this to be the good self



Prologue: How Sinners Use Law

- Sinners seek to use the Law via Works to remake their image into goodness
- This is self-delusion, psychosis, of one's goodness
- Jews, and Paul, defined their rightness via Law Works; religion of works



Paul's Struggle to Understand

- After salvation Paul spent some time in Arabia seeking to correlate the Old Testament with Jesus as Messiah whom he could no longer deny (Ac 20 10 14 17)
 - One of his defining moments was his vision of Heaven which occurred 14 years before he wrote of it, in Lystra (Ac 14:19-22; 2Co 12:16)
 - Paul was in the ministry over ten years before this vision;
 I believe he is revealing his inner struggle in Romans

Paul Discusses His Own Struggle

- Paul's writing subtilty moved from an abstract to a personal discussion common to all Christians (ICO 10-10)
 - Paul is careful to not elevate himself above others to give his argument more authority access 12:140
 - His admission that he shares their ongoing struggle lends credence to his discussion
 - Every Christian struggles to understand self and flesh

The Premise of the Struggle

- Paul logically states the premise of this struggle which he has systematically built toward since Chapter One
 - The Moral Law is spiritual; by implication, Good
 - Christian is betrayed by the flesh to the power of sin
 - Assumption: Salvation freed one from sin {And sinning}
 - O Reality: Christian continue to sin (1)- 1/8-109
 - Self Conclusion: I must be stronger to control sin (Ge 467)

Truth of the Problem: Ignorance

- The truth of this inner struggle is our ignorance of why it exists: Why am "I" still sinning?
 - O Key exists in the text itself staring at the reader's face
 - O Paul uses the word "I" twenty-five times in our text
 - Paul's perspective, our perspective, is from the "I" position: Am I not the hero of my worldview?
 - O Paul defines this inner struggle: Failure of self's strength

"I do not understand..."

- The first step in solving a problem is to understand what one does not understand; otherwise, one does not know what answer(s) to seek 04:7280
 - Paul, and us, do <u>not</u> do what we know to be right while simultaneously we do what we know to be wrong (Sin)
 - Salvation freed Christians from the death sentence of the Moral Law; but the Moral Law remains, defining right and wrong for maturing believer in Christ 046 547-189

Conundrum

- If one does what one knows is sin {Wrong}, then by admission one acknowledges the Law is Good {Right}
 - The Christian has a new nature which does not sin as it is of God's nature seeking to please Him
 - Sin is the <u>controlling</u> element causing us to sin against our new nature producing guilt
 - Where does the sin nature reside? The Flesh {σάρξ sarx}

Made in the Flesh

- Adam, and all his descendants, were made in the flesh
 - Adam, like Cain and all descendants, must control the flesh; sin lies at the door desiring one's destruction (0.465)
 - All failed and thus lived under the dominion of sin, except Christ who controlled His flesh via the Spirit
 - Flesh has always been the door to sin, covetousness, via lust of the flesh, lust of the eyes and the pride of life (1)0 2/16

Sin: Ultimate Stalker

- Satan stalks mankind as a lion to devour, ensnare, man in sin; not as a leader of sin but enslaved, without hope (17):580
 - Satan Active spiritual agent who is a slave to sin
 - World Political system in place, controlled by Satan
 - Flesh Body with its sin element enslaving man to sin
- Satan agrees with his sin nature, as do all sinners, totally rejecting God and His Truth; i.e., ungodly (8-1-1820)

Laws at War Within

- Paul clearly states there are two laws or systems at work in the Christian
 - Law of Sin Flesh constantly opposing the new nature and the good the new nature seeks to perform
 - Law of New Nature Moral Law which defines mature growth in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit (Ga 2/20)
 - Self Our individual nature seeks to control sin and do good; failing miserably without power of the Spirit @p 4309

Wretched People that We Are!

- In one exclamation of utter frustration, Paul sums up the reason for the failure: Self-empowerment which has been his theme throughout his discussion
 - O Self before salvation did not seek God's salvation (Re-1-10-18)
 - O Self rejected God's truth, building its ungodly worldview
 - O Self after salvation is powerless as a babe in Christ (100 MI)
 - Christ, our example, controlled His flesh by the Spirit

Old Testament Our Example

- The Old Testament teaches by example what the New Testament teaches by precept (10.6 10.6-10)
 - O Adam failed though taught directly by Christ (0e 367, 17) 210
 - Cain failed though warned directly by God (G+467)
 - Moses, through pride, made himself equal with God
 - David failed through covetousness troubling his family

No one is above the Law of God; All are accountable for Sin Adam, Moses and David were assed; yet, acted no different than Cain The same is true of Christians which is why we needed these examples

Christ is Our Example

- Biblical answer; people learn experientially: Christ, our example, lived in the flesh by the Spirit; so must we
 - God sent Melchizedek to strengthen Abram <u>before</u> his meeting with the King of Sodom, less he fall 1Gr 14-12-28
 - God sent Paul a thorn in the flesh after his Lystra stoning to remind him his strength was small que 123-10.
 - Our strength is small and faints in adversity for the flesh is weak; unless strengthened the Spirit @p. 24-10, Me 26-41; Ro 5-60

Christ is the Answer!

- Jesus Christ, the One who can deliver us from our bodies of death by maturation in Him: Discernment
 - Christian lives in the new nature by the power of Christ
 - Flesh continues to live partnered with sin until death
 - The commonality: "I" Thus, we are responsible to confess our fleshly sins rather than justifying them, for we will stand before Christ's Bema Seat (\$Co.54) 10-100

Epilogue: Truth of the Problem

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Christian and the Church

- As Christians ignore the truth of the Bible and become ensured in sin, so also do their churches
 - Church of Ephesus Lost its first love, Christ, to love weak self (god), enslaving itself to sin: world, flesh, Satan (8c 23-7)
 - Church of Laodicea Blind to its true condition, hiding behind the lie of its own worldview: Self as god
 - O Solution: Christ in you, hope of glory: Always (Cal 12428)
