"The *foreigner* and the *eunuch* are offered as striking cases in point of the all-embracing inclusiveness of verse 2. The Old Testament was never exclusivist on a national basis. Deuteronomy 23:3ff dealt with specific matters requiring special treatment, but Exodus 12:48-49 expresses the general position that the 'stranger' was always a welcome convert.

"Ezra and Nehemiah have been sadly misunderstood as if their motive was exclusivism. Their problem was to preserve the identity and purity of the people of God at a time when these things were under threat. This is a vital task, for if the people of God lose distinctiveness there is nothing for anyone to join nor any good reason for seeking to do so! An inclusive objective requires a distinctive base of operation."
