	b.	Last week we studied the doctrine of canon: The canonical books are those that the church received as representing the of the apostles to Jesus Christ, arising out of the "apostolic matrix" of the early church.
	c.	The idea of canon is a principle internal to Scripture, not a measure imposed upon Scripture from without. God's Word calls, summons, gathers, and his people.
2.	Тн	E SUFFICIENCY OF SCRIPTURE: We confess that Scripture is sufficient in
		: "everything one must believe to be saved" and "the entire manner of service ich God requires of us."
	a.	This doctrine of the sufficiency of Scripture naturally from what we have confessed about inspiration and the canon of Scripture.
		But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach to you a gospel contrary to the one we preached to you, let him be accursed. (Galatians 1:8)
	b.	This means we reject the idea that the authority of church tradition functions in any way as further revelation or in addition to Scripture.
	c.	This means we reject the idea of continuing revelation.
