The True Vine John 15:1-11 Reading: Mark 4:14-20

...pray...

How many of you plan to *put out a garden* this spring...?

When I think of gardening at BBB, I think of *Earl & Betty, Stan & Debbie, Russell Vinson, Josh & Rachel, Dan & Regan,* and of course I *must mention* my dear wife's *back-porch flower, fern, & fauna extravaganza*!

And many of us can still remember *Roy Hagerman*, one of Sedalia's *certified master gardeners*.

Gardening is hard work, but it can be fruitful work (most of the time)!

There is a *lot* to good gardening(soil preparation, seed selection, fertilizer, timing).

I recall my father starting 65 tomato plants in the spare bedroom early one spring.

And some years, despite all your efforts, something fails - barren branches...

They might as well have been **no** branches at all.

Jesus has a story about *tending a garden* – more spec., *a vineyard*.

Join me as I read John 15:1-11.

This is Jesus' Allegory of the Vineyard.

The lesson here is simple: *abiding* in Jesus is the *key* to the Christian life. 2X

The context is immediately after Jesus & His disciples have shared the *Last Supper* and *His Upper Room Discourse* (chap 13&14).

It's been a *long* and *challenging* night; now the *cross* is less than **12** hours away.

14:31 – "I do exactly as the Father commanded me. Get up, let us go from here".

Just as Jesus is about to go away, He teaches His disciples to stay close!

- 1. The allegory (vv.1-6).
- 2. The application (vv.7-11).

The first six verses of John 15 form an allegory (illustration).

- 1. Jesus was a *remarkable* teacher. He didn't simply put *points on a marker panel*, He told stories and used illustrations that brought truth alive!
 - a. OT history, current events, parable, metaphor, simile, allegory.
 - b. An *allegory* is a somewhat complex story that teaches a moral truth.
 - i. As we examine Jesus' *allegory of the vineyard*, we'll see that the story has *several moving parts*.
 - c. In contrast, Jesus' *parable of the lost sheep* (99 & 1) has *few* moving parts: *determined shepherd*, the **99** *safe sheep*, and the **one** *wandering sheep*!
- 2. Let me introduce the three characters (categories of characters) in Jesus' *allegory of the vineyard*. I'll mention them in the order they first appear:
 - a. V.1 Jesus, the *true vine*. Indeed, "*I Am the true vine*! Here is the 7/*final* of Jesus' "*I Am*" declarations in John (repeated in v.5). Jesus is claiming *deity*...!
 - i. The *vine* is the source of everything in a grapevine. It reaches down into the soil for *moisture and nutrients*, produces *lifegiving sap*, and pushes it **up** the *main vine* and **on out** into the *branches*, which eventually produce *fruit*.
 - ii. By *true vine*, Jesus, Jesus is claiming to fulfill and perform the redemptive tasks that God had once charged to Israel:
 - 1. God claimed Israel to be His vine that He had plucked up out of Egypt and *planted* in the Promised Land.
 - 2. God had constituted Israel with a *redemptive purpose*; to *declare His glory among the nations*!
 - 3. But over the centuries Israel proved to be a *fruitless nation*.

- 4. It failed to reflect God's glory abroad! Israel was *apostate*.
- iii. But through *faith* in Jesus, God's Son provides a way to enter God's kingdom.
 - 1. He is the one and only, the divine, the true source of life.
 - 2. In Jesus is *life*, and the *life is the light of men*! He is *the way*, and the *truth*, and the *life*...
- b. V.1 Second, the Heavenly Father is the vine dresser.
 - i. The *vine dresser* (*"farmer"*) takes care of the *vineyard*, its *vines*, and its *fruit*.
 - ii. His duties include *planting*, *fertilizing*, *watering*, *removing the fruitless vines*, and *pruning the fruitful*.
- c. V.2 And growing out from the *vine* are the many **branches**, wishing to *identified with Jesus* and required to be *fruitful for Jesus*.
- d. There is only **one** *true*, *life-giving vine*, there is only **one** *divine vine-dresser*, but there are many *branches*, and you can sort them out into **two** categories.
 - i. In vv. 4-5, Jesus points to the *fruitful branch*.
 - *ii.* In vv.4 & 6 our Lord warns us of the unfruitful branch
 - Follow in you NT as I read vv.4-6.
 - iii. Why do you plant *two rows of sweetcorn* or *six tomato plants* or a *vineyard full of grapevines*...? You *want* the fruit!
 - 1. God wants you and me to be *fruitful*.

- iv. What is the *key* to being a fruitful branch? Do you see it in v.4 & v.5 ? *Abiding*!
 - 1. Just as the branch abides in the vine, the Christian must *abide in Jesus* to bear fruit.
 - 2. What does it mean for the Christian to *bear fruit* and what does it mean for the Christian *abide in the true Vine*?
 - 3. We'll see that in the second half, as we consider the *allegory's explanation*.
- v. What is the *downfall* of the *unfruitful vines*? They failed to *abide* in the one true vine...the only source of life.
 - 1. What happens to the *unfruitful*?
 - 2. Do you ever use a pair of *pruning shears* or a *lopper* in your garden?
 - 3. The unproductive vine is *cut off. thrown away, dried up, gathered up,* and *burned up.*
 - 4. They **aren't** fruitful so they **don't** belong.
- vi. So there is the *true Vine*, the *Vinedresser*, and there are *abiding* and *unabiding* vines; *fruitful* and *unfruitfall*.

- 3. Before we *drill down deeper* into the parable's explanation I want to chase a *Greek language rabbit* (vv.4,5)!
 - a. V.5 we read, *"he who abides in Me."* Jesus takes the Greek verb *abide (remain; Gr. με.νω)*, turns it into a verb-form called a *participle*, then introduces it with the Greek term for *the*.
 - i. So in the Greek text (v.5) the expression underlying "*he who abides*" is simply **'o menw** "*the abider*."
 - ii. It's almost like a *title*! Wouldn't *you* like to wear that title?
 - iii. Look, there he goes, *the abider*! Do you know her, she's one of those *abiding ones*? Those people in that church, they just can stay away from Jesus; they are *all in abiders*!

Now let's hear Jesus' explanation of what it means to be "*an abider*." (<u>Read vv.7-11</u>).

- 1. As I've just pointed, to *abide in* is to *remain in* or *dwell in*. A *branch* growing out of the *vine* is an effective illustration of abiding!
- 2. I'd like to further point out that Jesus is now detailing the *fruitful life* of the believer who *abides in Him* and *bears good fruit*.
- And the *fruit* God is looking for in you can be broadly categorized as *spiritual virtues* (Gal 5:2; *love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control*); *spirit & truth worship* (Jn 4; Heb 13:15; *Through* [Jesus] *then, let us constantly offer up a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that give thanks to His name; new souls in the Kingdom* (Matt 28:19 "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations....").
- 4. Here. in Jesus' story, our Lord seems to highlight a harvest of *spiritual virtues* (similar to Paul's *Fruit of the Spirit list* in Galatians 5).
 - a. In **v.7**, Jesus teaches on the fruit of *prayer* and the necessary condition of *abiding*.
 - i. This time, not only are *you* to abide Jesus, Jesus' *word* (His Scriptures) are to *abide* in you.
 - ii. After all, we are commanded to *pray according to Jesus will*, and Jesus' *will* is found in Jesus' *word*.
 - iii. Beloved in the Lord, God answers the prayer of the *Scripture*-soaked abider! ☺ That's good *fruit*!

- b. In v.8, God is looking for *much fruit*!
 - i. Andreas Kostenberger points out that God evaluates quantity!
 - 1. Our verses refer to *does not* bear fruit, bears fruit, bears *more* fruit, bears *much* fruit.
 - 2. This reminds me of Jesus' *remarkable Parable of the Four Soils*. Only the fourth, fruitful soil pictured the *true believer* (*yielded a crop*), and even the true believer demonstrates various degrees of productivity(30,60,100).
 - ii. Lots of *fruit* produces lots of *glory* for God! Because when your life begins to demonstrate *much* fruit, it's because **God** is at work in your life. *You* can't produce the Fruit of the Spirit!
 - iii. *And*...lots of *fruit* produces lots of *assurance*. Only a *real* Christian demonstrates *real virtue*, *worship*, *and evangelism*.
- c. In **vv.9-10**, God is looking for you to *abide* (remain) in the *love* of the Father and the Son. *But how do you abide in their love...*?
 - i. According to v.9 you *imitate* Jesus by living in obedience to the *commands* of Jesus: *"If you love Me, you will <u>keep My</u> <u>commandments</u>."*
 - ii. I'm always tempted to make this so *esoteric*, so *abstract*! What a *relief*! If you *love* Jesus you'll *obey* Him; if you are *obeying* it can **only** be that you *love* Him and **He** *loves* you!
 - iii. After all (10), that's what Jesus says *He* does!

- d. Finally, **v.11**, Jesus promises the fruit of *full joy*.
 - i. Will you *abide* in Jesus?
 - ii. Stay in the *Word*?
 - iii. Pray to the Father?
 - iv. Keep Jesus' commandments?
 - v. *Love* Him be loved *by* Him?
 - vi. Will you bear much fruit!
- e. Joy! Do you want it Do you see it? (Read v.11.)

Are you "an abider"? I pray this morning that Jesus grant you joy, and your joy be made full!
