1. The need for reformation is brought about by the presence of sin.

- A. Preliminary Definitions and Principles
 - **1)** Reformation: When the Visible Church corporately repents of sin and grows in sanctification as a covenanted body.
 - 2) Revival: When the Spirit of God blesses a particularly society by converting many, and out of the overflow of the Gospel going forth, the Law also goes forth thru that land.
 - 3) An important general principle.
 - a) God judges individuals eternally.
 - **b)** God judges corporate bodies temporally.

- C. The Ongoing Application of our Passage (WCF xxv.4, 5; Rev 2:5; Lam 4:6; Jer 48:13)
- **D.** Preliminary Uses from the Text
 - **1)** Beware the presupposition of pride:
 - a) As if we are free from sin.
 - **b)** As if we are free from complicity and culpability.
 - 2) Be on guard against the early signs of spiritual decline:
 - a) Complacency: (Amos 6:1)
 - **b)** Examining external obedience without evaluating the internal belief.
 - 3) Be comforted that God offers freely His grace that we should repent.

11. In reformation, the Lord first convicts His people of sin.

- **A.** The people have forsaken God
 - 1) Their former state of fellowship with God (Ex 19:8).
 - **2)** The faithfulness of God.
 - 3) The excellency of God (Jms 1:17; Jn 4:14, NKJV; Isa 55:1).
 - 4) The unfaithfulness of man (Jer 2:11).
- **B.** The people look to idols
 - 1) It is a religion of our own doing (Ex 20:25).
 - 2) The quality of man-made religion.

- 3) The result of man-made religion.
 - a) False religion and corruptions of the true faith are internally unstable and logically incohesive.
 - **b)** False religion and corruptions of the true faith are unsatisfying (Jn 4:13b-14a, NKJV).
 - c) False religion will not bring life.
- **C.** Further Uses from the Text
 - **1)** We are to be faithful to the Lord.
 - 2) We are to turn from idolatry (1 Jn 5:21).
 - 3) We are to delight in the means of grace.

111. In reformation, the Lord then corrects His people in righteousness.

 - 1) Recognition of sin

 - 2) Putting sin to death
 - 3) Walking in obedience
- **D.** Further Uses from the Point
 - 1) All things must be measured by Scripture (Isa 8:20)
 - 2) We are to submit to the chastisement of the Lord (Lev 26:40-42)
 - 3) We are take the long view of sanctification, reformation and revival (Psa 12:6-7)
 - 4) We are to persevere in righteousness (Phil 3:1b)
 - 5) We are to be constant in training to war (Jdg 3:2)
 - **6)** We are to be persistent in righteousness (Micah 2:1)
 - 7) We are to be insistent in holiness (Titus 1:10-11)
 - **8)** We must be bold in conviction
 - **9)** We may not neglect the Church (Psa 22:6-9)
 - 10) We must depend upon God in prayer (Lam 5:21)
