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# The Attributes of a Faithful Minister, Pt. 1

1 Thessalonians 5:25-28 Study notes for November 13, 2016

I. Introduction: Imitating Paul, Heb. 13:7; 2 Cor. 11:23-29; 1 Cor. 11:1

#### II. The Attributes of a Faithful Minister, 1 Thes. 5:25-28.

A. The Faithful Minister is Concerned with His Own Holiness, v. 25.

Pray: προσεύχομαι (proseuchomai)

Recall, this term is the most comprehensive term for prayer in the Bible and the most frequent word used to describe prayer. It can be used for all or none of the different forms of prayer found in Scripture. As we have seen, it primarily references devotion and so speaks of a God-ward look of dependence. Here the focus clearly is on supplication which means it is used here as a synonym of  $\delta \epsilon \eta \sigma \iota \varsigma$  (deēsis)...

In fact, Paul employed a present tense in this passage which indicates that Paul was requesting "continual" prayer on his behalf. In other words, every time the Thessalonians prayed, Paul asked them to "pray for US"- specifically Silas, Timothy, and himself!

<u>An Important Observation</u>: Every other place in Scripture where Paul asks for prayer, he specifies what he wanted the church or the individual to pray. For example (cf. Rom. 15:30-31; Eph. 6:19-20; Col. 4:3-4; 2 Thes. 3:1-2)...

Yet in our text, Paul doesn't specify the content of the prayer... or does he? Recall, on account of the rarity of parchment, a common Biblical practice to preserve space when writing was to omit a word or idea if it was obvious. For example (cf. Eph. 5:21-22; 1 Cor. 2:13)...

Since Paul always gives the content of the prayer he is eliciting, we conclude that he must have done that here AND because it was so obvious, he didn't need to spell it out. In this regard, notice the flow of the text before us...

...well, what ought they to pray for? The obvious answer is, "That for which I am praying for you!"- which in this case was their Devotion to God (v. 23a) and their Personal Purity (v. 23b)!

\*Point: From this we behold the first attribute which characterized Paul as A Faithful Minister- A Concern for his own Holiness (cf. 1 Thes. 2:3-4). With Paul as our example, we learn that the Faithful Minister is vitally concerned with his own holiness, purity, and devotion- that he might ever and always please the Lord!

## \*Where We Live

- 1. Notice what happens when a servant of God neglects their own holiness (2 Tim. 2:21; 1 Thes. 4:7)...
- 2. We see this in the life of...
  - a. Moses, Ex. 4:24-26.
  - b. Paul, 1 Cor. 9:26-27.
- 3. What ought to be of major importance to us?

Robert Murray McCheyne wrote, "How diligently the cavalry officer keeps his sabre clean and sharp; every stain he rubs off with the greatest care. Remember you are God's sword, His instrument- I trust, a chosen vessel unto Him to bear His name. In great measure, according to the purity and perfection of the instrument, will be the success. It is not great talents God blesses so much as likeness to Jesus. A holy minister is an awful weapon in the hand of God." (Quoted in *Lectures to My Students* by Spurgeon, pg. 8)

# B. The Faithful Minister Unconditionally Loves the Brethren, v. 26.

Kiss: φίλημα (philēma)

This refers to an act of special respect and affection. In the early church, the "holy kiss" (typically given on the cheek) was a

widely used practice (cf. Rom. 16:16a; 1 Cor. 16:20; 2 Cor. 13:12)...

In the ancient world "a kiss" had three uses in the culture of the day. First there was...

- 1. The Kiss of Respect (cf. Lk. 7:37b-38, 45)
- 2. The Kiss of Veneration (cf. Hos. 13:2; Job 31:26-28a)
- 3. The Kiss of Love (Gen. 27:26; 50:1)

The practice of the Apostolic Church was derived from the latter, The Kiss of Love (cf. 1 Pet. 5:14a; Acts 20:37-38a)...

...when it is understood that (1) a person coming to Christ has entered into the family of God, which is to be characterized by even closer ties than those of any human family (cf. Mt. 12:46-50), (2) the relationships that exist in this "family of God" are eternal- in contrast to the temporal relationships enjoyed by earthly families (cf. Eph. 2:19-22; Heb. 12:9-10), and (3) our hearts have been bound together into one body in Christ (cf. 1 Cor. 12:17-20), it is no surprise to see that the Apostolic church adopted this love-act with a modification...

#### Holy

Based on our understanding of the word "holy," in the Bible a "holy kiss" would be different from any other kiss a person might give or receive in life; it was a kiss associated with God by which a Christian expressed to another Christian, "I am in it for the long hau!! You are more important to me than any other human relationship or convention. You are a brother or sister in Christ!"

# All the Brethren

This is in the emphatic position which means it is what Paul wanted the leadership in Thessalonica to walk away with as it related to Paul's personal instruction here! Paul wanted them to make sure that each and every individual member of the body of Christ in Thessalonica knew Paul was committed to them- Jew, Gentile, Rich, Poor, Male, and Female!

Why the emphasis on "ALL the brethren"? Recall the context and the various exhortations Paul gave to this church in this epistle (1 Thes. 5:14-15; 4:11-12; 4:8)...

...in this context it would only be natural for hard feelings, anger, resentment, embarrassment, and grief to arise on the part of some toward Paul. Accordingly, Paul wanted the entire body to know that he loved them and cared for them!

\*Point: From this we learn that another Attribute of the Faithful Minister of God is that he Unconditionally Loves All the Brethren. To the Faithful Minister, they don't allow any circumstance or context to alienate their love for their people. The Faithful Minister loves unconditionally!

#### \*Where We Live

- 1. Why is this such an important attribute for a minister?
- 2. Our day is not equipped to handle conflict... do you see it in your own family? How about the church?
- 3. What, a members of Christ's holy church, ought to be our response to conflict?
- 4. Finally, what is at stake if we do not address conflict Biblically (cf. Eph. 4:3; 1 Cor. 6:7b; 1 Pet. 4:8)?
