Introduction

- My unusual hobby in my teen years
- How long is your fuse? "The stature of a man is measured by the length of his fuse."
- Explosive anger is...
 - a work of the flesh Galatians 5:19-21
 - leads to all kinds of abuse—James 3:6, 8-10
 - by-passes the mind—Proverbs 14:29; 17:27
 - does not defuse tense situations but rather inflames them—Proverbs 15:18
- Remedy: Walking in the Spirit and the fruit of the Spirit—Galatians 5:16

The Fruit of Patience

A. Patience with PROBLEMS—James 1:2-4

- 1. Defined: An attitude of heart whereby we accept and tolerate unfavorable circumstances.
- 2. Progression: Trials produce perseverance, then character, and finally hope.-- Romans 5:3-5
- 3. Key: We experience through the Spirit the incredible love of Christ.—Romans 8:35-39
- 4. Never used of God, for God has no problems which He cannot handle.

B. Patience with PEOPLE—Galatians 5:22; Romans 12:17-21

- 1. The **Meaning** of "longsuffering"
- 2. The **Models** of Longsuffering
 - a. Our God is longsuffering
 - 1) He has every right to be ticked off at us. -- Romans 1:18
 - 2) Our God has a long fuse. -- 2 Peter 3:9, 15
 - b. **Jesus Christ is also longsuffering.** -- 1 Timothy 1:12-16
- 3. The **Means** of Longsuffering—Romans 12:17-21
 - a. **Don't try to get even!** Let that up to God—Romans 12:17, 19
 - 1) Example of David in the Psalms—Psalm 54, 56, 57, 58, etc.
 - 2) Exhortations from James—James 5:4-9
 - b. **Replace wrath with love!** -- Romans 12:17,20-21
 - 1) Whole context is about love.
 - 2) Scriptural illustration—Proverbs 25:21-22

C. Seek peace, if at all possible!—Romans 12:18

- 1) Two keys to pursuing peace—Colossians 3:12-14
 - a. **Forbear**—giving others time and room to grow; putting up with immaturity.
 - b. **Forgive**—giving others the gift of the release of the offense; letting go of the offense
- 2) Learning to "keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."—Ephesians 4:1
