# "Principles of Christian Worship"

(Part 3 - Selected Scriptures)

Principles that would apply to any worshipper living in any culture:

Christian Worship (in any culture) should be:

- 1. **Doxological** Corinthians 10:31 "Do, <u>do all to the glory of God</u>."
- 2. Spiritual John 4:23 True worshippers shall worship the Father <u>in spirit</u> and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him.
- 3. **Biblical** We are admonished to worship God "in spirit and <u>in truth</u>" (John 4:24)
- 4. **Christ-Centered** John 16:13-14 Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come...<u>He shall glorify me</u>:
- 5. Scripturally Organized 1 Corinthians 14:23-40
- 6. Suitable for a Holy, Righteous God

## "Questions to Ask About Worship Music"

#### 1. **Does the music <u>glorify</u> God?** Or the <u>musician</u>? (Exod. 15:1, 2, 21, 21; I Chron. 15:27, 28; 16:9, 23; II Chron. 20:21, 22; Ps. 95:2; 105:2; Acts 16:25; Eph. 5:18, 19; Col. 3:16).

#### 2. Is the music <u>sensual</u>?

Rom. 13:14 - "But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof." (Does it move the flesh or the spirit?)

#### 3. Is the music <u>worldly</u>?

I John 2:15-17 - "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world.

#### 4. Is the music worthy of God's <u>dignity</u>?

Psalm 7:17 - "I will praise the LORD <u>according to his righteousness</u>: and will sing praise to the name of the LORD most high." (Does it fit [suit] the holy character of God and His Word?)

#### 5. Does the music (melody, harmony, and rhythm) <u>match</u> the text of the song?

(The music should support the Scripture or truth being sung) (You can't sing "Holy, Holy, Holy" to a disco beat) "The perception of the message is greatly colored by the vehicle which carries it" (Danny Sweatt).

#### 6. What <u>message</u> does the music communicate without the words?

Does the music "sound like war"? (Exod. 32:17-20) The music Moses and Joshua heard Israel singing (during their idolatry and wild dancing) was <u>not</u> sounds of contentment, satisfaction, peace, serenity, joyfulness, and worship. Rather, what was communicated was discontentment, rebellion, unrest, confusion, defiance, and a lack of reverence for God (Garlock & Woetzel)

#### 7. Is the music <u>acceptable</u> to God?

Eph. 5:10 - "*Proving what is acceptable unto the Lord*" (Could it be sung in His presence in Heaven? Would Jesus listen to it?)

#### 8. Does the music <u>edify</u> me or <u>others</u>?

I Cor. 10:23 - "All things are lawful for me, but all things are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but all things edify not." Rom. 15:2 - "Let every one of us please his neighbor for his good to edification"

#### 9. What <u>physical response</u> will this music produce?

[If one was to dance to this music, what type of dance would he do?] [What type of physical behavior would the music bring out?] [What emotion(s) would this music stimulate?]

#### 10. Is the music <u>well-written</u>?

(Is the music doctrinally correct? Theologically sound?) The sacred music's <u>words</u> must square with the Word (sacred Scripture). We must never <u>twist</u> a truth of Scripture to make it fit a melody line. Christian Worship (in any culture) should be:
