I. The command to love

- A. Is there a command harder than God's to Abraham (22:1-2)?
 - 1. to 'tempt' is to be understood as a testing (James 1:13)
 - 2. the timing of this testing (vs. 1)
 - 3. the weightiness of this command (vs. 2)
 - 4. the why of this testing? (1 Peter 1:7)
- B. Yet there is a command infinitely greater than God's to Abraham
 - 1. God commanded His Son to do 'His business on earth' Luke 2:49; John 4:34 a. the central focus of Genesis 22 is John 3:16 (John 17:4)
 - b. Jesus lived His life knowing & following the commandment of His Father: John 10:17-18 and John 14:31

II. The Act of Love

- A. True love is a sacrificial act (John 3:16)
 - 1. Observe Abraham's response: he obeyed fully and heartily
 - a. fully: see vs. 3; 9-10
 - b. heartily: see vs. 5
 - 2. Observe Isaac's submission as an act of love likewise
 - a. he also obeyed without an objection
 - b. Isaac is but a faint glimmer of the bright glory of Golgotha
 - Unlike Isaac, Jesus walked fully conscious to the cross
 - Unlike Isaac, Jesus died in the context of holy wrath (Is. 53:10)
- B. True love can be no greater than what the Father and the Son did for sinners

III. The purpose of love

- A. God's purpose in Abraham's sacrifice was to test his love for His Savior
- B. Yet the purpose of Father's sacrifice of His Son wasn't only to *show His love*1. It was to make it possible to pardon our sins in a holy and just way

According to Thy gracious Word, in meek humility, This will I do, my sacred Lord, I will remember Thee.

Thy body, broken for my sake, my bread from heaven shall be. The testamental cup I take and thus remember Thee.

Gethsemane, can I forget?
Can I such conflict see,
Thine agony of blood and sweat,
And not remember Thee?

When to the Cross I turn mine eyes, and look to Calvary, O Lamb of God, my sacrifice, I must remember Thee.

Remember Thee, and all Thy pains, and all Thy love to me. Yes, while a breath, a pulse remains, will I remember Thee.

And when these failing lips grow dumb, and mind and strength will flee,
When I must end this journey here,
Jesus, remember me!
