Reports of the 12 "Spies"

Numbers 13

- 40-day reconnoitering
- Findings
 - Great fruits; "milk and honey"
 - People are strong (e.g., <u>Anakim</u>)
 - Cities are fortified

- Caleb gave positive report, asserting that God would give the victory
- Ten gave
 pessimistic report:
 the land devours
 its inhabitants

Response of the people [Looking back to Egypt] (Numbers 14)

- 1.Crying, weeping, grumbling
- Would that we died in Egypt/wilderness
- Let us go back to Egypt with a new leader

- Joshua laments the rebellion and appeals for fear of the LORD
- People take up stones to stone
 Joshua and Caleb (and Moses/Aaron?)

Lord's response

- I will annihilate the people and make a new nation from Moses
- Moses pleads on their behalf
 - Based on the Lord's reputation
 - Recalling that the LORD is slow to anger and abundant in lovingkindness

God recalls 'ten' acts of rebellion

- 1. Red Sea
- Marah (bitter waters)
- 3. Wilderness of Sin(→ manna)
- Manna kept overnight
- Collected manna on the Sabbath

- 6. Rephidim (water from rock)
- 7. Horeb (golden bull)
- 8. Taberah (fire)
- Kibrothhattaavah(quail for 1 month)
- 10.Kadesh-Barnea

Punishment

- The people (20 years and up) will not go into the land
- Excepted were Joshua and Caleb
- One year in wilderness for each of the 40 days the spies were in the land (40)
 - 40 seems to be a number of testing in the Old Testament
- The ten spies die by a plague

Punishment

- Israel turns and decides to go against the land; they are defeated by Amalekites and Canaanites
- ~ 37.5 years spent wandering in the wilderness
 - 18 months had passed on arrival to Kadesh-Barnea
 - The events beginning at Num 20 with Israel back at Kadesh occur in the 40th year, leaving 37.5 years in between

Further Wilderness Events

Numbers 16 – 19

Authority Crisis (16 – 18)

- The Challenge by Korah (16.1-14)
 - Korah of the tribe of Levi
 - Dathan and Abiram, Reubenites
 - Claimed that all Jews were holy and had direct access to the LORD
 - 250 others join them

Authority Crisis

- God's Response in Judgment (16.15-50): Moses and Aaron <u>vindicated</u>
 - Earth opens and swallows the three rebel leaders; fire destroys the 250
 - People grumbled at the harsh judgment and 14,700 killed by a plague

Red Heifer Offering (19)

- Occasion
 - Unclean b/c an encounter with dead body
 - Much death in the wilderness
 - Repeated need for cleansing
 - Rather than repeated killing of animals, a red heifer killed and burned and its ashes kept and used to ceremonially cleanse the unclean

Red Heifer Offering (19)

- Significance as a type
 - Ashes evidence of the animal's death
 - Jesus died once and his death continues to apply

Numbers 20

Preparations to Leave Kadesh-Barnea

- Back at Kadesh-Barnea (20.1-13)
- Death of Miriam
- Grumbling of people re water

[Looking back to Egypt]

Grumbling of people re water

- Water from the rock
- Moses and Aaron <u>rejected</u> from going into the land
- Meribah: 'quarrelling'

Preparations to Leave Kadesh-Barnea

- Refusal of Edom to allow Israel's passage (20.14-22)
 - Deuteronomy informs us that God instructed Israel not to provoke Edom, Moab, Ammon
- Death of Aaron on Mount Hor (20.23-29)



Travel to Transjordan

Numbers 21

Preliminary Events Numbers 21.1-9



- First Victory: Attacked by King of Arad at Hormah (1-4)
- Another <u>complaint</u> about manna (5-9)

[Looking back to Egypt] – after 40 years!

Avoiding Moab (at first!)





Pre-emptive Strike in Moab

Numbers 22 – 25

Balak and Balaam

- Recruitment of Mesopotamian diviner-prophet, Balaam (22)
- Balaam's Prophecies/God's Power (23 24)
- Balaam's Counsel (25; Cf 31.16)



Balak and Balaam

- Fervor of Phinehas halts the plague (24,000 died)
 - God conquered both physically (Sihon, Og) and spiritually (Shittim)

Final Preparations before Entering the Land

Numbers 26 – 36

Events across the Jordan

- Numbering the New Generation (26)
 - o Some gains, some losses
 - Used in allotting the land proportionally
- Joshua to Succeed Moses (27.12-23)
- Instructions Concerning Offerings (28 30)
- Judgment on <u>Midianites</u> re Shittim (Balaam) (31.1-17)
- Reuben, Gad and Half of Manasseh
 Occupy Transjordan (32)

Events across the Jordan

- Preparation to Possess the Land (33 35)
- Cities of Refuge (35)
 - Cities of Levites (with their pasture lands)
 - 48 Levitical cities, 6 of which were cities of refuge
 - Cities of refuge for unintentional killing (manslaughter)
- Levites also received the tithes
- Inheritance of Land (36)

Contents of Deuteronomy

Chapters 1 – 4

- Review of events of preceding
 38 years (1 3)
 - Joshua charged to lead the people, to give them an inheritance in the land (3.28)
 - Moses forbidden to enter the land (3.23-29)
- Instructions on possession of the land (4)

Chapters 5 – 11

- Mosaic Covenant reviewed (5, 6)
 - Teach the children! (6.1, 2, 7)
- Israel a separated (holy) people (7, 8)
- \circ Exhortation (9 11)

Statutes and judgments (12 – 26)

- 1. Apostasy (12, 13)
- 2. Diet (14)
- 3. Sabbatical year (15)
- 4. Three main feasts (16)

- 5. Authority and kings (17)
- 6. Priests, prophets and cities of refuge (18, 19)
- 7. Warfare and death (20, 21)
- 8. Domestic and civil regulations (22 26)

Chapters 27 – 30

- The mandate: Blessings and Cursings (27, 28)
- The issue: Disobedience would forfeit Israel's presence in the land (28.36-68)
 - There are consequences to our actions!
- Covenantal reaffirmation: The Palestinian Covenant (29 – 30)

THE PALESTINIAN COVENANT

- Promise that God would bless them if they obeyed his commandments and curse them if they disobeyed
- Special promises to Israel (to be completely fulfilled on the return of Jesus Christ)

Special promises to Israel

- 1) to gather the scattered Israelites from all over the world and to bring them back into the Promised Land (30.3-5)
- 2) to regenerate the Israelites of that time and their descendants by <u>circumcising</u> their hearts so that they would love him totally (30.6)
- 3) to judge Israel's enemies (30.7)
- 4) that the Israelites <u>would obey</u> God and that God would prosper them in their obedience (30.8-9)

- Moses' Last Words (31 33)
- Counsel to <u>Joshua</u> and other leaders (31; <u>v. 3</u>)
- Predictions (32, 33)
 - Song of Moses (32)
 - Cycles of defeat and restoration
 - The final words of Moses (33.26-29)
- Death of Moses (34)
