
Assisted Listening System

God Loves You and Has a Difficult Plan for Your Life (Luke 9:51-62)

1. The Confused and Misguided Zeal of James and John (v.51-56)

- Luke is the only evangelist who describes the ascension of Jesus to heaven following His passion, death, and burial (24:40-53). For the following ten chapters (Lk. 9:51-19:41), Luke will describe matters concerning discipleship:
 - Jesus' mission is to save, give life, ultimately die (9:22, 44), and has already been spoken of by Mary (1:46-55), Simeon (2:29-32), and Himself in His inaugural address (4:16-30).
- Luke comments that the "days are drawing near for Him to be 'taken' up to Jerusalem" as He
 "set his face" to Jerusalem (v.51). The reader is informed of Jesus' resolve and singlemindedness to what awaits Him in Jerusalem.
- There have already been allusions to His upcoming "exodus" (9:31) and death (9:21-22, 44).
 Now. Jesus seems to be mindful of what awaits Him in Jerusalem.
- It is in Jerusalem where the prophets are killed (13:33) and where He will be arrested, betrayed by a kiss, flogged, and abused by the soldiers. In Jerusalem, He will be stripped naked, nailed to a cross, buried, and raised from the dead.
 - Although Jesus, as God, necessarily possesses omniscience, He chooses not to access it as man, depending upon the Father for all things (Jn. 5:19).
 - In preparation for His trek to Jerusalem, since Samaria was the shortest route, Jesus sent messengers ahead of Him as He did previously (9:1-6), which is proleptic imagery to that of those who were sent to enter the Promised Land (Ex. 33:2, 14; Deut. 4:37-38) and those who prepare the way for the Lord (Isa. 40:3-5), specifically, in the appearance of Elijah (Mal. 4:5).
- The Samaritans did not receive any of His messengers because of the socio-cultural hatred between the Jews and Samaritans. This hatred was centuries old, because the Samaritans were considered "half-breeds."
- Jews, during the Assyrian captivity, married with the Assyrians, had children who had Gentile blood, and thus were unclean (Deut. 7:3-4; Phil. 3:5).
- To the Samaritans, the Jerusalem temple represents a false religion. To the Jews, the
 Samaritans represent a false religion (the temple in Mount Gerizim). The Samaritans, who
 set up their rival temple at Mount Gerizim, established rival liturgy and published their
 version of the Pentateuch. The Jews responded by publicly cursing the Samaritans in the
 synagogues and praying that they might not inherit eternal life.
- James and John (Sons of Zebedee) requested to incinerate the Samaritans by calling down fire from heaven upon the villages that refused to welcome Jesus, hearkening to Elijah's actions in response to wicked King Ahaziah (2 Kgs. 1:1-18).
 - James and John have yet to understand the mission of Jesus, confusing His First with His Second Coming. They are intoxicated with their power and are "triggerhappy."
 - They have forgotten Jesus' direction to those who refuse them (6:27-28, 36; 9:5) and are wrong about the Son of Man: He will not accomplish His mission through physical force but through His suffering, rejection, death, and resurrection (9:22). His Second Coming, however, will be different (Rev. 14:17; 19:14).
 - o Jesus is not Elijah, but Elijah-like. Their response merited a stern rebuke (v.56).

2. The Call and Cost of Following Jesus (v.57-62)

Luke records three interactions with unnamed men under the auspice of discipleship. "Follow" is the common thread as Jesus interacts with these three candidates (v.57, 59, 61).

- A. Candidate #1: "Mr. Hasty Ignorance" (v. 57-58)
- As Jesus is "going along the road," one man offers himself brashly and confidently. This man commits to "following Jesus wherever He will go" (v.57).

- Jesus loves this would-be disciple and informs him of the life he can expect if he follows Him.

 Jesus does not "complain" but instead "informs."
- This unnamed man would expect to follow Jesus like most students before a rabbi: he would go from one village to the next, make friends, and learn the Torah. It would be a life of ease and standard rabbinical studies.
- Jesus educates this man that He has no permanent dwelling as the Son of Man.
 - The "Word-made-flesh" had nowhere to lay His head and is forever a stranger in the world He created (Jn. 1:14; 1 Pet. 1:1, 17; 2:11).
- Interestingly, Jesus mentions "foxes" (v.58):
 - This may be an allusion to Herod, whom He calls a "fox" (13:32). Herod, who
 possessed power and authority, lived in luxury while God incarnate was rejected by
 those He came to save (Jn. 1:11).
- Jesus challenges this man to count the cost of discipleship if he is to follow Jesus.
- B. Candidate #2: "Mr. Hesitation and Full of Excuses" (v.59-60)
- Unlike the first candidate, Jesus calls this second to "follow Him" (v.59).
- He calls Him "Lord," yet his actions betray his words as this man has the "chutzpah" to tell Jesus his conditions for following Him.
- The reader learns of the man's request: He wants to wait until his father dies (v.59).
 - We are unaware of how old this man is, how old his father is, the condition of his father, or any details of his father's health.
- The Torah requires children to honor their parents (5th commandment). This is taken up in the
 NT (Eph. 6:2) and reaffirmed under the Law of Christ. Jesus rebuked the Pharisees, scribes, and
 their disciples for "Corban" (Matt. 15:5, Mk. 7:11) and for refusing to care for their parents in
 their old age.
- While the command to honor parents is in the Torah, Jesus speaks to this man specifically and commands him to follow Him.
- We are not given more details than Jesus telling this man to follow Him.
 - "The "spiritually" dead can bury the physically dead (v.60). This man is called to
 proclaim the kingdom of God. When receiving this direct summons, he is not to
 return home, as to return home and "wait" for his father to die is to commit idolatry.
 - Following Jesus has priority over everything, even one's parents. This man needed what the first candidate possessed: urgency.
- C. Candidate #3: "Mr. Convenience-Reminiscence" (v.61-62)
- Like "Mr. Hesitation and Full of Excuses," he is a "but" man or "let-me-first" man who has the "gall" to set up conditions to follow Jesus (v.59, 61).
- This man requests to say goodbye to his loved ones first by getting his affairs set in order.
- Jesus uses a farming metaphor, not primarily Elisha's encounter with Elijah since this man is different from Elisha (1 Kgs. 19):
 - Elisha was allowed to say goodbye to his father and mother, but not this man in Luke. Elisha removes all connections with his previous life, even to slaughtering the oxen.
- This man in Luke wants to return to his old life and wait for a convenient time to follow Jesus.
- The plowman who looks back not only furrows in a jagged line but also demonstrates a divided heart and affection. Those who put "both hands to the plow":
 - One hand guides the plow while the other holds the long goads, which spur the oxen to work. Since the plow is light, the plowmen must lean forward with all their weight to keep the share in the ground. The plowman who looks back is not committed to his task because he is easily distracted by what is "behind" him.

During His earthly ministry, Jesus possessed the single-mindedness, complete devotion to service, and unconditional faithfulness He requires from all His disciples (Jn. 4:34). Did these three men follow Jesus?
