Acts 17:16-21

Full of Idols

Proposition: *In a world full of idolatry, the Gospel alone answers it.*

I. Athens: A City-Altar to Idols. (vv. 16)

- a. Its rampant idolatry shows imagination's tendency to create idols.
 - i. Rooted in willful ignorance of God. (v. 23, 30)
 - ii. Fruited in vicious curiosity for all things spiritual. (vv. 20, 21)
- b. Its intellectual culture shows reason's conceit to defend idolatry.
 - i. Rooted in indomitable religiosity. (v. 22)
 - ii. Fruited in shrewd philosophical systems. (v. 18)

II. The Aeropagus: A Council of Vain Curiosities. (vv. 19-21)

- a. Its existence shows idolatry's intense grip on the heart.
 - i. Employed to curate novelty for public pleasure. (v. 21)
 - ii. Furnished with experts esteemed locally and abroad. (vv. 19, 32)
- b. Its vain curiosity shows institutional idolatry at its most dangerous.
 - i. Celebrating wisdom but enslaved to folly. (vv. 24-29)
 - ii. Multiplying idols but neglecting the Image of God. (vv. 16, 30)

III. Paul: An Apostle of Jesus Christ to Idolaters. (vv. 16-18)

- a. His reaction to idolatry shows imagination captive to Christ.
 - i. Provoked by idols rather than enticed. (v. 16)
 - ii. Zealous for Christ rather than religiosity. (v. 17)
- b. His message against idolatry shows reason enlivened by faith.
 - i. Focusing on Jesus as the image of the unknown God. (v. 18)
 - ii. Emphasizing Jesus' resurrection as the key to knowing God. (v. 18)

IV. Two Key Applications for Athens Today.

- a. First, resist the Athenian urge to reimagine God.
 - i. One, because *idolatry is exceedingly wicked*. The Spirit of the Living God is greatly provoked by idolatry, as also we who are captive to Christ and made alive by faith should be. **Therefore**, *be ever careful not to provoke God* by cherishing private idols in your heart, however beautiful. Be appalled by them and preach the Word of Truth to your heart.
 - ii. Two, because *idolatry is all too easy*. Athens is the incarnation of the human heart, hellbent on the creation, establishment, and defense of ceaseless idolatry. **Therefore**, *be ever watchful of novel ideas*, especially those which we find the most interesting and captivating. Cleave to Christ. "*Once* God has spoken; twice have I heard this: that power belongs to God" (Ps. 62:11).
- b. Second, cultivate a Pauline zeal for the Gospel.

- i. One, because *mere curiosity begets idolatry*. Treating Jesus as an intellectual exercise is exceedingly dangerous and reveals deeprooted, malevolent idolatry. **Therefore**, *be ever zealous to cultivate heart-affection for Jesus* and not intellectual assent, lest you merely indulge him with a hearing but dismiss his serious call to repentance.
- ii. Two, because the Gospel answers idolatry. The proclamation of the Gospel to idolaters must never compromise on but rather climax in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. His resurrection is all our hope. **Therefore,** be ever courageous to declare the simple and unimaginable Gospel revealed in Jesus Christ, the revealed and resurrected image of Almighty God.
