- <u>I.</u> <u>Introduction: Our final studies in II Samuel will cover two great Psalms of David.</u>
 - A. Why does God reveal Himself to us in Psalms?
 - B. Why are these two Psalms of David placed at the end II Samuel? 22:1-51 23:1-7
 - 1. These Psalms of David correspond to the song of Hannah to frame the whole collection (I and II Sam. were originally one long book). I Sam. 2:1-10
 - 2. The songs of Hannah and David poetically summarize the key theological teachings of I and II Samuel: deliverance, Messiah. I Sa. 2:10 II Sam. 22:51 23:1
 - C. II Samuel 22 is a Royal Psalm of Thanksgiving (and is almost identical to Psalm 18).
 - D. David's Psalm is sung in three part harmony.
 - 1. David sings of his own life experience.
 - 2. Jesus sings this Psalm; some parts are only fully true of Him. 22:21ff Lu. 24:44
 - 3. We can sing this Psalm of deliverance.

II. A summary of praise to the LORD. v. 1-4

- A. Introduction: David wrote this song to honor the LORD Who delivered Him. v. 1
 - 1. The song summarizing David's illustrious life gives glory to the LORD, rather than merely extolling King David. Ex. 15:1ff
 - 2. David can look back upon many occasions of deliverance -- from Saul, from foreign enemies, and from rebels in Israel. 22:18,49
- B. The LORD is a great Savior. v. 2-3 Ps. 31:3 91:2 Gen. 15:1 I Sam. 2:1,2,10
- C. Summary: I call upon the LORD Who saves me from my enemies. v. 4 Gen. 12:8 Isa. 55:6 Ro. 10:12 Ps. 86:3,5,7
- D. Jesus sings: God has raised up a horn of salvation for His people. Luke 1:68-69
- E. We sing: When God delivers us, we owe Him praise.

III. God delivered me from deadly trouble. v. 5-20

- A. I was overwhelmed with distress. v. 5-6
 - 1. The Psalmist's desperate need is vividly described. Ps. 116:3 88:7,17 Jonah 2:3,5
 - 2. David sings of his own experience. 15:14 21:16 I Sam. 20:3 23:8
 - 3. Jesus also experienced great suffering and distress. John 1:10-11 12:27 Lu. 22:44
 - 4. We should expect afflictions in this life. I Pe. 4:12 II Tim. 3:12 Luke 12:52
- B. I cried out to the LORD for help and He heard. v. 7 Ex. 2:23 Ps. 50:15
 - 1. Where is the temple from which the LORD heard David's voice? Ps. 11:4 Is. 6:1ff
 - 2. Jesus also cried out to God His Father. Heb. 5:7-8 Mt. 26:38-39 27:46
 - 3. We are invited to call upon Him in our distress. <u>I Pe. 5:7</u> Mt. 11:28ff Heb. 13:6
- C. The LORD rushed to my aid. v. 8-16 Ps. 97:1ff 68:7ff Is. 64:1ff Hab. 3:3ff
 - 1. David uses vivid poetic language to express how God powerfully responds to the cry of His loved one. Ex. 15:6ff Acts 2:19-20 Joel. 2:28ff Is. 24:18f Job. 41:19ff

- 2. God comes in judgment against those who endanger and oppress his people.
- 3. God answered David's cries.
- 4. Nature was in tumult at Christ's coming to deliver us. Mt. 2:2 27:45,51-54 28:2
- 5. When Jesus returns for our final deliverance, the earth will be shaken. Mt. 24:29ff Joel 2:28ff Mal. 4:1-3 II Pe. 3:10 Rev. 6:12ff 11:13ff
- 6. The LORD hears and helps us. Acts 4:31 16:26 Mt. 7:7 Dan. 9:20ff Jer. 33:3
- D. The LORD delivered me. v. 17-20a
 - 1. The LORD dramatically rescued David. Ex. 2:10 Ps. 18:17
 - 2. Jesus was not abandoned to Sheol (the grave) but was raised from the dead and exalted at the Father's right hand. Acts 2:24ff Heb. 5:7
 - 3. God powerfully intervenes in our lives.

IV. Why does the LORD deliver? v. 20b-25

- A. David proclaims that the LORD has rewarded his righteous obedience. v. 20b-25
 - 1. David was delivered because the LORD delighted in him. v. 20b I Sam. 13:14
 - 2. How can this be true, in light of David's great sin? 11:1ff 24:1ff Ps. 32:1ff 51:1ff
 - 3. David's life, though not perfect, was characterized by obedience to God. 8:15 I Ki. 15:5 14:8 9:4
 - 4. When David did sin he humbly repented. 12:13 24:10,17 Ps. 32 51
 - 5. There is a God-pleasing righteousness according to the law that doesn't fall into pride or hypocrisy. Luke 1:5-6 2:25 23:50 Mt. 1:18 Acts 10:22 Gen. 6:9 Job 1:1
 - 6. The LORD rewarded David's faithful obedience. I Sam. 26:23-24 Ps. 66:18-19 Deut. 28:1ff Lev. 26:1ff
 - 7. The LORD didn't hear or rescue disobedient Saul. v. 42 I Sam. 28:6
- B. Only Jesus can say, without any qualification, that He has been rewarded according to His righteousness. <u>Ps. 24:3-5</u>
 - 1. The Father delighted in Jesus. Mt. 27:43 Ps. 22:8
 - 2. He is the Righteous One Who perfectly performed His Father's will. John 8:29 15:10 Acts 3:14 7:52
 - 3. He never sinned. I Pe. 1:19 II Co. 5:21 Heb. 4:15
 - 4. He is rewarded for His righteousness. Acts 2:33 Rom. 1:4 Isa. 53:11-12
- C. In what sense can we sing these words with David and with Jesus?
 - 1. None of us is righteous enough to merit God's favor. Rom. 3:10ff,20 Eph. 2:1ff
 - 2. The LORD rewards us with salvation because of what Jesus has accomplished for us as our representative. Rom. 5:19 II Co. 5:21 I Pe. 3:18
 - 3. We receive God's perfect righteousness through faith alone. Gen. 15:6 Phil. 3:9 Eph. 2:8-9 Gal. 3:10-11
 - 4. David also needed the grace and forgiveness which would come through Christ. Ps. 32:1ff Rom. 4:6-8 3:23-26
 - 5. Yet it is also true that those who follow Christ should live lives characterized by holy obedience. Eph. 1:4ff Mark 8:34ff John 14:15 Js. 2:14ff Titus 2:11-15
 - 6. God blesses and honors the practical moral obedience of His people. <u>I Pe. 3:12</u> Ps. 37:11 Mt. 5:5 25:14-46 Heb. 6:10
 - 7. Ultimately, God rewards us for His work in us. Eph. 2:10

- B. Those who have been delivered should praise God with great exuberance.
