# The Comfort of Judgment

- Nahum was a prophet of Judah.
- Nahum means 'comfort'!
- Nahum predicted God's judgment on Assyria.
- This prophecy was given about 660-650 BC.
- This was about 100 years after Jonah.
- Assyria fell to the Medes and Babylonians in 612 BC.
- Assyria was one of the great ancient empires.
- Assyria destroyed the northern kingdom of Israel in 722 BC.
- Assyria almost defeated Jerusalem in 701 BC.
- Judah was a vassal of Assyria.
- Assyria was one of the most cruel and ruthless societies in the ancient world.

Divine judgment on evil as seen in His judgment on the nation of Assyria (Nineveh, the capital).

'Nineveh was a wicked, imperialistic and deceitful metropolis with an arrogant and unscrupulous lust for power and domination manifested in merciless war-mongering. In addition to its military exploits, Nineveh was condemned for its ruthless trade practices and insatiable materialism. – Reformation Study Bible

Christ is the Judge of the nations! (2 Thessalonians 1:6-10) We are not called to be like Christ in His judgment, but to love like Christ now because of His future judgment! (Romans 12:14-21)
