- o Discern (and derivatives) are translations of the Greek word anakrino in the NT.
- o To distinguish, to separate out by diligent search, to examine.
- o The ability to properly discriminate or make determinations.
- Related to wisdom.
- o A discerning mind demonstrates wisdom and insight that go beyond what is seen and heard. God's Word is "spiritually discerned." The Spirit gives us spiritual discernment
- o A discerning person will acknowledge the worth of God's Word.
- o Unless we have true discernment, how can we determine what is "evil" and what is "good?"
- o To maintain the purity of the gospel, the church muse distinguish truth from heresy.
- Wisdom also demands that we properly discriminate between what is "best" and what is merely "good."
- o Discernment has many collateral benefits.
- o May our prayer be "I am your servant; give me discernment that I may understand your statutes." Psalm 119:25

 - Wisdom is a characteristic of God. The books of Job, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes along with some Psalms such as 1, 119 are called Wisdom Literature. Sometimes
 people include James in the NT as Wisdom Literature.

 - The wisdom of Israel became one of the noblest expressions of their faith, and is one of the preparations for the revelation of God through Christ, who is the

 - The wisdom of which Paul spoke in the epistle to the Corinthians was the wisdom of the Greeks. He contrasted this wisdom with the foolishness of preaching. 1

 - The biblical concept of wisdom is different from the classical view of wisdom, which is sought through philosophy and human rational thought to determine the mysteries of existence and the universe.
 - o The first principle of wisdom is that people should humble themselves before God in reverence and worship, obedient to His commands.

 - Webster's 1828 dictionary the right use or exercise of knowledge.
 - The choice of laudable ends and the best means to accomplish them. Wisdom in act, effect or practice.
 - If wisdom is to be considered as a faculty of the mind, it is the faculty of discerning or judging what is most just, proper and useful, and if it is to be considered as an acquirement, it is the knowledge and use of what is best, most just, most proper, most conducive to prosperity or happiness.
 - Practical wisdom is nearly synonymous with discretion. It differs somewhat from prudence; prudence is the exercise of sound judgement in avoiding evils; wisdom is the exercise of sound judgement either in avoiding evils or attempting good. Prudence then is a species, of which wisdom is the genus.

 - Both recurring themes in the Bible, are related by not synonymous.
 - Wisdom- the ability to discern or judge what is true, right, or lasting.
 - Cannot exist without knowledge.
 - A gift from God. James 1:5 God blesses us with wisdom in order for us to glorify Him and use the knowledge we have of Him.
 - Proverbs, perhaps the best place in the Bible to learn of biblical wisdom.
 - After obtaining knowledge of God, he can begin to provide us with wisdom through Christ, who the Bible says is wisdom itself.1 Corinthians 1:30
 - Acts properly upon knowledge (gathered over time through study of the Scriptures).
 - The fitting application of knowledge.
 - Knowledge- information gained through experience, reasoning, or acquaintance. Can exist without wisdom.
 - To fear the Lord is the start on the path to knowledge.
 - What is gathered over time through study of the Scriptures.
 - Knowledge understands the light has turned red; wisdom applies the brakes.
 - Knowledge sees the quicksand; wisdom walks around it.
 - Knowledge memorizes the Ten Commandments; wisdom obeys them.
 - Knowledge learns of God; wisdom loves Him.

 - ◆ In the case of human knowledge to know from observation. 1 Thessalonians 1:4, 5, 2:1, 2, 2 Thessalonians 3:7
 - DIFFERENCES BETWEEN GINOSO AND OIDA OF MENTION
 - Ginosko often refers to inception or progress in knowledge.
 - ♦ Implies and active relation between the one know knows and the person or thing known.
 - ♦ As in Matthew 7:23 "I never knew you." suggests I have never been in approving connection with you.
 - \diamond Romans 1:21 simply suggests that they could not avoid the perception.
 - Oida often suggests fulness of knowledge John 8:55
 - \diamondsuit The object has simply come within the scope of the knower's perception.
 - ♦ As in Matthew 25:12 "I know you not." suggests you stand in no relation to Me.
 - Epiginosko to observe, fully perceive, notice attentively, discern, recognize.
 - A more special recognition.
 - May suggest advanced knowledge or special appreciation as in Romans 1:32 "knowing the ordinance of God" means knowing fully well.
 - Nouns
 - Gnosis a seeking to know, an enquiry, investigation.
 - In the NT especially of spiritual truth.
 - Epignosis exact or full knowledge, discernment, recognition.
 - A strengthened form of ginosko.
 - Expressing a fuller or a full knowledge, a greater participation by the knower in the object known.
 - More powerfully influencing him.

 - o The truth or facts of life that a person acquires either though experience or thought.
 - o The greatest truth that a person can possess with the mind or learn though experience is truth about God. Psalm 46:10, John 8:31-32
 - This cannot be gained by unaided human reason. Job 11:7, Romans 11:30
 - Acquired only as God shows Himself to people in nature and conscience. Psalm 19, Romans 1:19-20; in history or providence. Deuteronomy 6:20-25, Daniel 2:21; and especially in the Bible. Psalm 119, Revelation 1:1-3
 - o Mental knowledge by itself, as good as it may be, is inadequate; it is capable only of producing pride. 1 Corinthians 8:1, 13:2

 - It is knowledge of the heart, not the mind alone. The book of Proverbs deals primarily with this kind of knowledge.
 - Experiential knowledge is that gained though one's experience. Genesis 4:1, 2, 2 Corinthians 5:21, 1 John 4:7-8
