Intro—Behold a Palm Tree in the Desert! (Exod 15:20–27)

What Does the Palm Tree Teach us about Love on Two Horizons?

- I. First Horizon—Perpetually Conquer and Delight in your Palm Tree (Song 7:7–9)
 - A. Husbands, have eyes only for your wives!
 - B. Keep your fountain AND your conscience pure and clear (Prov. 5:18-20)
 - C. Husbands, don't be a "conqueror-and-mover-oner"
- II. Second Horizon—The Beauty and Stature of the Church
 - A. The Church Adorns her Stature and Beauty through Internal Unity (6:13b)
 - B. The Church Adorns her Stature and Beauty with Balance (Song 7:6, 7; Cf. Titus 2:9, 10; Eccl. 7:18)
 - 1. Behold how Christ views the stature of the church, tall and stately, pleasant on the eyes and sweet to the taste.
 - 2. Adorn Christ's imputed righteousness of Christ with beauty and balance (Titus 2:9, 10; Eccl. 7:18).
 - C. The Church Adorns her Stature and Beauty by Bearing Fruit in Old Age (Psalm 92:12–15)

Questions for discussion and application:

- 1. Read Song 7:7–9. What does the "palm tree" teach husbands about how to love their wives on the first horizon?
- 2. Read Prov. 5:18–20. To what does the "fountain" refer and how do men keep that fountain pure?
- 3. What are two extremes to be avoided when "adorning the doctrine" of the imputation of the active obedience of Christ to the account of the believer through faith?
- 4. Read Psalm 92:12-15.
 - a. What is it that allows a saint to flourish like the palm tree, still bear fruit in old age and to be full of sap and green?
 - b. How do we keep from getting jaded in the Church, especially in old age?
 - c. If the actions of people in the church (members or office-bearers) cause us to be disillusioned in our Christian faith, what does that say about us?
