- The Meaning of "Gentleness"

 1. Also translated "meekness" in Scripture
- 2. In Classical Greek literature, gentleness is...
 - Used of people or things which have a soothing effect on others
 - Used of the right atmosphere in a learning environment with civil discussion
 - Used to describe controlled conduct by those with power
 - Plato: The "cement of society"—"politeness, courtesy, and kindness"

The Models of Gentleness

- Never officially attributed to God the Father!
- Jesus Christ models gentleness.—2 Corinthians 10:1
 - Jesus Christ was both "tough and tender" in His teaching others. Matt. 7:28-29
 - As the "good shepherd", he gently leads the young—Isaiah 40:10-11; Matt. 19:14 b.
 - In contrast to the religious leaders, he is "gentle and lowly in heart"—Matthew 11:28-30 c.
 - Even in his dialog with the religious leaders, Jesus gently answers their questions
 - Jesus did not promote Himself, but rather model and taught servant leadership. Matt 20:25-28 e.
 - Best seen in his humble embracing the cross—Phil. 2:6-8

The Means to Gentleness

- Does not come naturally but produced in us by the Spirit of God.
- It begins with our own response to the Word of God—James 1:19-22
 - Our need to be "swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath"
 - Our need to "receive with meekness the implanted Word"
- How Paul gently ministered to others —2 Cor. 12:12; 1 Thessalonians 2:4-8, 13 3.
- Specific area that need to be handled gently.
 - Exercising discipline in the body of Christ—Galatians 6:1; 1 Cor. 10:12-13
 - Sharing the gospel or teaching truth to unbelievers or sceptics—1 Peter 3:15-16; 2 Tim. 2:24-26
