Marriage

Genesis 1:26-28

Genesis 3:16 To the woman he said, "I will surely multiply your pain in childbearing; in pain you shall bring forth children. Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, but he shall rule over you."

Ephesians 5:21 submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ.

The filling and control of the Holy Spirit will lead us to a spirit of humility, to the spirit that gives us the desire to seek the welfare of others before our own and to be mutually submissive.

Submit (hypotassō): bring into subjection

Submission for a Christian is a voluntary yielding in love. It is not an acknowledgment that the person I submit to is superior to me and that I am inferior to him or her.

Ephesians 5:22–24 Wives, submit to your own husbands, as to the Lord.

Ephesians 5:23–24 For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior. ²⁴ Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands.

1 Peter 3:1–2 Likewise, wives, be subject to your own husbands, so that even if some do not obey the word, they may be won without a word by the conduct of their wives, ² when they see your respectful and pure conduct.

Love (agapaō): to have love for someone or something, based on sincere appreciation and high regard—'to love, to regard with affection, loving concern, love.

Ephesians 5:1–2 Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. ² And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

Sanctifying and cleansing

He might sanctify (hagiazō): to cause one to have the quality of holiness

John 17:17 Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth.

Present (paristēmi): to cause something to be or to serve as

Ephesians 1:16–23 I do not cease to give thanks for (Wife's name), remembering (wife's name) in my prayers, ¹⁷ that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give (wife's name) the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, ¹⁸ having the eyes of (wife's name) heart enlightened, that (wife's name) may know what is the hope to which he has called (Wife's name), what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power toward (wife's name) who believes, according to the working of his great might ²⁰ that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the one to come. ²² And he put all things under his feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, ²³ which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Ephesians 5:28 In the same way husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself.

Ephesians 5:29 For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ does the church,

John 17:19 And for their sake I consecrate myself, that they also may be sanctified in truth.

Ephesians 5:30–32 because we are members of his body. ³¹"Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." ³²This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church.

Ephesians 5:33 However, let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband.

The apostle began with one couplet 'love' and 'submission'. He ends with another 'love' and 'respect'. We have seen that the love he has in mind for the husband sacrifices and serves with a view to enabling his wife to become what God intends her to be. So the 'submission' and 'respect' he asks of the wife express her response to his love and her desire that he too will become what God intends him to be in his 'leadership'.
