He Came! – The Rich Becomes Poor, the Poor Become Rich 2 Corinthians 8:9 Reading: Luke 2:1-7

In late **54 A.D**. the church in **Corinthian** had determined to *lead the way* in giving to a *famine relief offering* for the saints in **Judea**. But there were some *challenges*:

- Corinth was a long ways (*as the crow flies*) from Palestine!
- And the Corinthian Christians (*Gentiles*) were a long ways (*culturally*) from the poor, *once Jewish*, believers in Judea...

Well, **FF** into the *middle* of **2** Corinthians...twelve months had passed, & their gift was still **nothing** more than a good intention.

Let's catch-up w/ the **Apostle Paul** as he tries to *resuscitate* the Corinthians' *generosity*...

Read 2 Cor 8:1-11 (focus is on v.9).

...He became poor...you...become rich...

So is this a giving message, or a Christmas message?

Beloved, it's *both*! Christ is the *Giver*...and the *Gift*!

So let's consider...

Four questions that evaluate the wealth & poverty of Jesus' coming.

- 1. What did it mean for Christ to be *rich*?
- 2. What did it mean for Christ to become *poor*?
- 3. What does it mean for you to be poor?
- 4. What could it mean for you to become *rich*?

Beloved, **don't dawdle** in a world of *spiritual good intentions*, & **don't leave** this place this morning in *spiritual rags*!

Christmas reminds us that Christ came to make you rich!

Our text (9) begins: For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was <u>rich</u>. What did it mean for Christ to be rich?

- 1. The Corinthians *knew*. *We* know! Because Christians (by *defn*) know the Gospel, we *know* the wonderful truth that Paul unfolds here (9)! And to start w/, we know that *Jesus' coming* was all about *grace*.
 - a. **Defn**: "*Grace*" is the undeserved favor that God pours on you, simply because He loves you, and **that** favor from God results in your spiritual life & spiritual vitality (**i.e.** in your spiritual wealth).
 - b. Grace is inseparable from Jesus The Lord Jesus Christ. When the NT writers use His full title, they want your attention! Lord King (Master) of everything. Jesus man (perfect) & Savior ("You shall call His name..."). Christ promised & anointed One, Messiah.
 - c. Jesus is immeasurably gracious, and He was immeasurably rich!
- 2. We **mustn't** let Paul's *vocabulary* confuse us! *Rich & poor* here are **not** *economic indicators*! This is **not** a proof-text for the *faith & prosperity heresy*. We are **not** tallying *silver& gold*, and *denarii & dollars* in **v.9**.
 - a. Certainly, God *created* everything (you), *owns* everything (you!); the *cattle on a thousand hills*. He has *no needs*!
 - b. And as we read in **Psa 50** *Everything that moves in the field is mine. If I were hungry I would not tell you, for the world is Mine, and all it contains.* ... But that's **not** really *Paul's point...*

3.) But the bottom line of Christ's wealth is simply this: He was God.

- 3. But the *bottom line* of Christ's *wealth* is simply this: *He was God*. Jesus' *wealth* is understood in His *deity*. *Is* Jesus God? Is *that* what the Bible teaches? Let's *explore* that for just a minute...
 - a. Phil 2:5-6 Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus, who although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality w/ God a thing to be grasped (we'll return here in a few min.)
 - b. Col 2:9 In Him (Jesus) all the fullness of the Deity dwells...
 - c. **Heb 1:1-3** God's *Son. Heir* of all things. *Agency* of creation. *Exact representation of God. Upholds* all things (Sustainer). *Who does these things*? Only **God!**
 - d. Perhaps the *greatest single indicator* of Jesus' *deity* is that He is *eternal*. To be *eternal* means no one *created* Jesus –He has *always existed*. Think of this: *eternality* & *deity* go *hand in hand*. I.e. to be *eternal* is to be *God*.
 - i. John 1:1 In the beginning, was the Word was w/ God, & the Word was God. → The Word already was when the beginning began... Then in v.14 And the Word became flesh & dwelt among us. The eternal and incarnate Word is God...is Jesus!
 - ii. Here's how Jesus *summed it up* for His enemies (**Jn 8**) *"Before Abraham was… I am."*
- 4. Every Christmas we read in **Matt 2** that the **magi** (*wise-men*) filled the streets of *tiny Bethlehem* with an *oriental caravan* laden with *gifts gold*, *frankincense*, & *myrrh*.
 - a. But the **magi's** *wealth* was **nothing** compared with the *glories of heaven*! ...to the *mysteries* & *privileges* & *riches* of Christ's Deity.

Our Lord Jesus, eternal in the heavens, was rich!

Then v.9 continues: For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor. What did it mean for Christ to become poor?

- "Incarnation" means "God becomes man." Incarnation is the theology of Christmas. But not only theology, "Incarnation" is the economy of Christmas! Christmas is wrapped-up in, "He became poor." Friend, here is the jewel of our precious text: He became poor!
 - a. Again, *rich & poor* are **not** financial terms, but indicators of His *deity* & His *humanity*. And His *humanity* embraces both His *birth &* His *death*.
 - b. *Christmas* is in Christ's *poverty*, as His *deity* became veiled in His *humanity*. What did it mean for the *Word* to *become flesh*? What did it *cost* Jesus' to become a man ...?
 - i. *Incarnation* meant being completely *dependent*. There were years in *Bethlehem & Egypt & Nazareth* when the *King of Glory* depended on the *wisdom & love & hands* of His *young mother* **Mary** & *carpenter step-father* **Joseph** to meet His needs.
 - ii. To become man meant hunger...thirst...fatigue...hardship. Lk
 9:58 "The foxes have holes & the birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay His head."
 - iii. It meant being the *target of malicious gossip*. Jesus' enemies *taunted* Him for what *we* know is the miraculous *Virgin Conception* (John 8:41): "We were not born of fornication."

c.) But not only did Christ's poverty meant Christmas, it also meant Easter...

- c. But not only did Christ's *poverty* meant *Christmas*, it also meant *Easter*...
 - i. Betrayal. Mocking. Pain. Beatings. Scourging...Crucifixion a criminal's death on the cross- in our place, for our sins.
 - ii. Turn w/ me to Phil 2:5-8. Jesus wealth (deity) is in v.6. Our Lord's poverty (incarnation) is in vv.7&8: not grasping, emptied Himself, bond-servant, likeness of men, humbled Himself, ... death on a cross.
- d. Yet Paul's *focus* here is not simply what it meant for the Lord Jesus Christ to *live* & *die* in His "*Incarnation-poverty*." The Holy Spirit wants us to adore that *grace-soaked* act, the moment of Christ generously abandoning His wealth and embracing (stepping into) the poverty of frail flesh.

What wondrous love is this, O my soul...O my soul? What wondrous love is this, O my soul...?

What wondrous love is this, ...

...that caused the Lord of Bliss, to bear the dreadful curse, for my soul...for my soul.

...to bear the dreadful curse, for my soul...!

- 2. And so, we mustn't *race past* those crucial **three** *words* in the middle of Paul's inspired text: *"for your sake."*
 - a. It was for *you, "for your sake,*" that Christ, *being rich*, yet *became poor*.
 - b. "For your sake" points us to our next two questions...

What does it mean for you to be poor?

- 1. The *reality* of your *spiritual poverty* is only *implied* here in Paul's words, but it is *clearly* & *necessarily* implied. If you & I were **not** *poor*, then Christ had **no cause** to *leave Heaven* and become *man*.
- 2. "Spiritual poverty" describes your complete lack of *resources* to *pay-off* the just *penalty* levied by the Judge of All the Earth against your sins.
- 3. The Bible teaches our *complete sinfulness* (*total depravity*) a lot of different ways so that *grace* can pounded thru our *thick heads* & into our *calloused hearts*; all men & women are...
 - a. *Overtaken by spiritual darkness* men loved darkness rather than light, for their deeds were evil.
 - b. *Sick* (Jesus)–"*It is not those who are healthy who need a physician, but those who are sick; I did not come to all the righteous, but sinners.*"
 - c. Slave (2 Tim 2) you were slaves to Satan....and thus to sin.
 - d. Child of wrath (Eph 2) we were children of wrath, even as the rest.
 - e. Dead (again, Eph 2)– You were dead in your trespasses & sins. You were dead in your transgressions.
 - *f. Enemy of God* (James 4) *Whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God.*
- 4. *Tally* that all up; the *ledger* is clear, we are *destitute spiritual impoverished*.
- 5. The ultimate *outcome* of spiritual *bankruptcy* is eternal *foreclosure* on your *soul*, with no further *opportunity* for *recovery* or *bailout*!

That's what it means for you to be *spiritually poor*! (But fortunately, that's *not all* that this verse means...)

For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you through His poverty <u>might become rich</u>. What could it mean for you to become rich?

- 1. *Have you ever dreamed of being rich*? Did you really think that last *Powerball ticket* would have done it for you!?! ⁽²⁾ Christian, the Bible promises that Jesus has already made you *rich*!
 - a. Psa 23:1 The LORD is my Shepherd, I shall not want...
- 2. Here is "rich" in God's economy: all your sins forgiven (<u>2x</u>). (PAUSE) Do you remember what the angel said to troubled Joseph (Mt 1)? "She will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins."
- 3. But wait...there's more! Here, in part, are the "riches" of God's Kingdom:
 - a. New nature (\rightarrow "born again").
 - b. Reconciled to God peace. (No longer enemies & prodigals.)
 - c. Adoption as God's sons & daughters.
 - d. Inheritance (co-heirs w/ Christ).
 - e. *Holy Spirit* (*living* **in** you; *never* to leave you!)
 - f. Fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control).
 - g. Spiritual gifts (\rightarrow Serve one-another).
 - h. Effective prayer (boldly approaching God's throne of grace).
 - i. *More prayer* (Jesus *interceding* for you **from** the *throne of grace*).
 - j. God's wisdom (God's word). (You lack? Just ask!)
 - k. *Power* (*you can do all things* that God requires of you *through Christ who strengthens you*).
 - 1. *Purpose* (\rightarrow to become *like Christ*; *share* the Gospel; *reach* heaven).
 - m. Eternal Assurance (guarantee). Jude 24-25.
 - n. Eternal life. Psalm 23:6 I will dwell; John 3:16 shall not perish
- 4. John MacArthur sums up our text like this: *The central truth of Christianity is that Christ's voluntary poverty makes the spiritually poor...spiritually rich*!

Beloved, *you've hit the jackpot*! Throw away your *Powerball* ticket; you are already *rich*! Christ became *poor* – you can be *rich*!

Paul reminded the Corinthian believers of Jesus' *wealth & poverty* to *motivate* them to *sacrificial good deeds*.

If we don't recognize that before we go, we haven't fully *exegeted* the apostle's words. So I want to make 2 *applications* from **v.9**.

- 1. First, how should it change your life that Christ became poor for your sake?
 - a. The Spirit doesn't intend for this text to **end** w/warm, Gospel gratitude. Not even at Christmas! (Gratitude is the *start*, not the *end* of Paul's intent!)
 - b. The point is that your *gratitude* /joy should overflow into generosity. Did you notice v.11? Finish! Desire (fueled by joy in Christ's gifts) → completion (of generosity towards *one another*).
- 2. Second (fundamentally), how do you become rich through Christ's poverty?
 - a. If you are **w**/**o** the Lord Jesus Christ this morning, you are *destitute*.
 - b. Jesus offers you *riches*. \rightarrow
 - i. See yourself as *bankrupt*. Turn to Christ.
 - ii. See His *poverty* dying on the *Cross, for you sins, in your place.*
 - iii. You must also trust in His *resurrection* God raised Jesus on the 3^{rd} day to prove our sins are fully paid for & eternal life can be ours.
 - iv. What does God ask of you? **Turn** to Jesus, **believe** Him, follow Him.
- 3. Beloved, **don't dawdle** in a world of *spiritual good intentions*, & **don't leave** this place in *spiritual rags*! **He came** to make you *rich*!
