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Title: What About Halloween?

Bible Text: Public reading of God's Word: Deut. 18:9-14.

Jeremiah 10:2 Thus saith the LORD, Learn not the way of the heathen, and be not dismayed at the signs of heaven; for the heathen are dismayed at them.

Panimula:

- 1. The Babylonian Captivity destroyed Jerusalem and transferred Jews to live in Babylon.
- 2. God specifically commanded the Jews not to learn the way of the heathen (unsaved) and relvative to the "signs of the heaven."
- 3. The question is what do Christians have to do with Halloween?

I. <u>The History of Halloween</u>:

- A. Halloween began with the Gaelic-Celts of Ireland. They were not Christian or a Chrsistian society. They were pagan.
- B. They celebrated the "harvest festival" (Celts Nov.1) (Jews middle Oct. 15-21/Tishri).
- C. Their harvest festival is called "Samhain" end of harvest season, at the entrance of "winter."
- D. Their celebration started at midnight on Oct. 31. in Irish literature and mythology the spirits of the dead return and visit the places or homes they vacated and move around.
- E. This was also called "Old Year's Night" the night of the witches. [old Celtic calendar's last night of the year]
- F. They practiced "Divination."
- G. They would wear spooky costumes in order ward off the evil spirits or scare the evil spirits away from themselves or their homes wearing a costume is an attempt to personify the old spirits or souls.
- H. Other activities such as Dream interpretations, bonfires for cleansing and protection (to keep away the Devil) were observed.
- I. The practice of "souling" and/or "guising" they go from house to house looking for soul-cakes (trick or treat). This is supposed to bring good luck/bad luck. [Tagalog Pangangaluwa at Kakanin]
- J. The symbol of the Jack-o-lantern is also pagan in origin. The Fable of "Stingy Jack." False teaching or doctrine called "fables" (1 Tim. 1:4; 4:7; 2 Tim. 4:4; Titus 1:4; 2 Pet. 1:16).
- K. When Rome took over Ireland, the Celts celebrated and assimilated their worship Festival of "Feralia" (for the dead) at "Pomona." (goddess of the harvest).
- L. The Tradition of the Catholic Church: Halloween is "Hallow's Eve" (Evening before All Saint's Day, Oct. 31) followed by All Souls Day, Nov. 1. – this was officially switched to these dates by Pope Gregory IV in A.D. 835.
- M. Halloween means "The Eve of All Saints" (ca. 17th century). [Catholic/Religious] (Also known as "Allhallowtide.").
- N. The Tradition of the Protestants Martin Luther posted the 95 Thesis on the door of the Castle Whittenburg sa Germany. [Protestant/Religious] [religious organizations call this: Reformation Day]

II. <u>Biblical Guidelines</u>:

- A. God commanded us not to live or to learn the ways of the heathen. We are to live unto Christ not culture and the behaviors and practices of society.
- B. God commanded us not to listen to false teachers and witches: Deut. 13:1-3.
- C. Witchcraft is an abomination and so is idolatry in worship and in life: 1 Sam. 15:23.
- D. God forbids these type of activities: Deut. 18:14, 9-12.
- E. Lev. 20:6.
- F. But the Jews still got involved in sin and idol worship because their hearts were not right with God. (2 Kings 17:17; Isa. 2:6).
- G. Who is a Biblical saint? The one who is "in Christ" the saved, born-again believer Acts 9:13; 32; Rom. 1:7; 12:13; Eph. 4:12; Col. 1:2). We become saints because of salvation (1 Cor. 1:30; 6:11).
- H. We can honor the memory of our departed loved ones but we cannot pray to them, nor change divine judgment.
- I. The secret things belong unto God (Deut. 29:29).

Conclusion:

- 1. We are not like the Celts, the Romans, the Catholics, nor the Protestants. We are Biblical Baptists. (Christmas, Resurrection Sunday, Thanksgiving, The Lord's Day Sunday; Baptism, at Lord's Supper are our Christian celebrations.
- 2. We will not go along with the world that is in opposition to God.
