Though met with opposition, De Cock didn't emerge

modernistic and liberal preaching dominant in the State Church. Colleagues tried hard to sway him from his chosen path, mocking those who embraced the preaching of De Cock as less informed than cattle in a cowshed.

De Cock stood firm, echoing the biblical motif that the weakest means fulfill God's will. Thus, the unassuming and seemingly ordinary pastor of a modest rural church became a resolute champion of sovereign grace, a powerful reformer in Christ's church. In the

As De Cock fervently proclaimed his message, small events unfolded, each contributing to the culmination of his work. With intensified preaching, the crowds swelled, triggering heightened opposition. The expanding throngs compelled the Consistory to suggest enlarging the auditorium. Despite the congregation raising funds, the project faced resistance from the building overseers who, against

the people's wishes, denied permission. This marked the initial whispers

of persecution.

Surprised to find the Canons of Dordtrecht as a creed of the Churches he served, De Cock, in 1833, published a pamphlet featuring the Canons. In its introduction, he passionately called for "a return . . . to the true service of God . . . which had been forsaken by a majority of the population as it had turned to the idols of man's corrupted and darkened reason." This sentiment didn't sit well with those who preferred the Canons to be left in obscurity within the

churches.

As the crowds swelled, people from different congregations sought De Cock to baptize their newborns. Constrained by their conscience, they hesitated to have their babies baptized in their own churches due to heretical practices and the replacement of the old Baptism Form. Unable to affirm the truth of their church's teachings, they turned to De Cock. After thoughtful consideration, consultation, and fervent prayer, De Cock, with his Consistory, baptized these children. This bold move angered the authorities and sparked protests from De Cock's colleagues, who brought the issue to Classis in strong objection.

A committee from Classis delved into an inquiry, during which De Cock boldly released a pamphlet with a powerful title that did little to pacify truth's adversaries: "Defense of the True Reformed Doctrine and of the True Reformed Believers, Attacked and Exposed by Two So-called Reformed Teachers, or the Sheepfold of Christ Attacked by Two Wolves and Defended by H. DeCock, Reformed Teacher at Ulrum." These two teachers, mentioned in the title, were his colleagues who had written against De Cock and the principles he championed.


