	Questions for Family Discussion
•	Consider the response of Jerusalem and its religious leaders to the news of Christ's birth. Which is more offensive them being troubled by how this could completely change their lives, or their indifference toward Him and refusal to search for Him? Are modern church members ever guilty of such things? How so? Explain why the wise men falling down to worship Christ is such a remarkable demonstration of faith. While God can use anything to lead people to Christ, (e.g., a star) how does God ordinarily lead us to Him? (v. 6)

Did God <u>make a **mistake**</u> in leading the magi to Jesus by way of King Herod? Name some things in your life that look like "complications" to God's plan. Are they **actually** complications? Think: how might God use them for good?
