II. Jonathan and David enter into intimate friendship. 18:1-4

- A. Jonathan's soul was knit to David's. v. 1a
 - 1. Jonathan takes the initiative.
 - 2. Why might this be an unlikely friendship?
 - 3. What drew Jonathan to seek friendship with David?
 - 4. They are valiant men of like faith, zeal and courage. 13:3 14:6ff 17:26,36,45,47
 - 5. Their lives become bound up in one another. Gen. 44:30
- B. Jonathan loves David as himself. v. 1b,3b
 - 1. This passage along with others is used by some to assert that Jonathan and David had some kind of romantic or sexual relationship. <u>II Sam. 1:26</u>
 - 2. This is a love of friendship, not romance. 16:21 18:16,22 I Ki. 5:1
 - 3. David and Jonathan were godly married men who kept God's law. Lev. 20:13
 - 4. Their love is one of intimate friendship.
 - 5. They exemplify biblical love which is active and giving. I Jo. 3:18
- C. Jonathan and David make a covenant with one another. v. 3a 20:16-17 23:18
 - 1. We are not told the specific content of the covenant (agreement), but we can know much from their subsequent actions.
 - 2. Jonathan defends David against Saul's false accusations. 19:1-6
 - 3. Jonathan becomes an informer warning David about Saul's evil plans. 20:1ff
 - 4. Jonathan pays a price for his loyalty to David. 20:30-34 22:8
 - 5. Jonathan encourages David. 23:16-18
 - 6. David honors Jonathan in death and cares for Jonathan's son, Mephibosheth. II Sam. 1:17ff 9:1:ff
- D. Jonathan gives David his royal attire. v. 4
 - 1. What is the significance of this act?
 - 2. In ancient times clothing denoted status. Ex. 37:3 Gen. 41:41-42 Esther 6:8
 - 3. It appears that Jonathan is relinquishing his royal status as crown prince to David. Num 20:22-28 I Ki. 19:19f
 - 4. Did Jonathan know that David had been chosen and anointed by God as the next king? 16:1 23:17
 - 5. Of whom does Jonathan remind you? John 3:30
 - 6. May God give us the humility of Jonathan. Luke 14:11 Ps. 84:10

III. Application: Friendship.

- A. We all need friends. Prov. 18 Ecc. 4:9-12 I Co. 12:20f
- **B.** Choose your friends wisely.
 - **1.** Your friends have a powerful influence on you. <u>Pr. 13:20</u> He who walks with wise men will be wise, but the companion of fools will suffer harm.
 - 2. Avoid foolish companions: angry, drunkards, gossips. <u>Pr. 14:7</u> 12:26b 4:14-15 22:24-25 23:20 28:7 20:19 Ro. 12:1-2 II Co. 6:14-16 I Co. 15:33 5:10 Js. 4:4
 - 3. Some may seek your friendship for the wrong reasons. Pr. 19:4,6 1 27:6b 29:5
 - 4. Parents should take special interest in the friends their children make. Pr. 1:10f

- C. Carefully pursue a few close friendships.
 - 1. You can only have a few really intimate friends. 18:1 Jo. 15:12f 13:21,3
 - 2. One true friend is better than many fair weather acquaintances. Pr. 18:24 20:6

 A man of many friends comes to ruin, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother...Many a man proclaims his own loyalty, but who can find a trustworthy man?
 - 3. Loyal friends are rare and precious. I Sa. 18:1-5 20:1-42 23:16-18 II Sa. 1:26 9:1f Phil. 2:19-30 II Ti. 1:15-18 4:9f
 - 4. The most important friend you will choose is your spouse. 2:17 Gen. 2:24 Mal. 2:14 Song 5:16
- D. You must be a friend in order to have friends. 18:1,24 Ro. 15:2
 - 1. Friendship requires effort and initiative.
 - 2. Don't spoil the friendships you have: gossip, quarrels, betrayal, etc. Pr. 17:9b
 16:28 20:3 25:19 27:14,6b Ps. 41:9 He who repeats a matter separates intimate friends... He who blesses his friend with a loud voice early in the morning, it will be reckoned a curse to him.
 - 3. Loving friendship is expressed by action. Le. 19:18 Mt. 19:19 Mk. 12:31 Ga. 5:14

E. Cultivate friendship.

- 1. A friend is loyal. Pr. 27:10a
- 2. A friend is trustworthy. Pr. 11:13 25:13,19 3:27-28 A friend will be there for you in your time of need. 17:17 27:10b Lu. 10:29-37 A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for adversity...
- 3. A friend is generous. <u>Pr. 14:21</u> 28:27
- **4.** A friend is quick to forgive. <u>Pr. 17:9a</u> <u>19:11</u> He who covers a transgression seeks love... it is his glory to overlook a transgression.
- **5.** A friend offers you wise counsel and encouragement. Pr. <u>27:9</u> Oil and perfume make the heart glad, so a man's counsel is sweet to his friend.
- 6. A friend will encourage you in the LORD. I Sam. 23:15-16 I Cor. 16:13-14
- 7. A friend will admonish and correct you. 27:5-6 28:23 Lev. 19:17 Ro. 15:14 Gal. 6:1-2 2:11-14 Better is open rebuke than love that is concealed. Faithful are the wounds of a friend, but deceitful are the kisses of an enemy.
- 8. A friend will sharpen you: making you a better person. Pr. 27:17 He. 10:24 Iron sharpens iron. So one man sharpens another.
