The Pilgrim's Gathered Worship Psalm 27¹⁶

What drives your worship? Why are you here gathered under God and with God's people? Listen to this quote and see what you think.

...I go to church, first of all to renew my covenants I made with Heavenly Father at my baptism. It is a weekly reminder that I have covenanted to keep his commandments and always remember him. Remember is an often use word in the scriptures, and any method to help us keep the example of Jesus in our minds is a good thing.

Secondly, I go to hear the good word of God. Listening to talks giving advice and encouragement is uplifting. Hearing someone tell how they have overcome trials in their lives gives me encouragement to keep going.

Third, I go to be with my fellow Christians. I go to associate and work with them to help our community and the world which coincidently helps us to develop our talents and abilities. It was Jesus who said that if you lose yourself in the service of others, you will find the real you and be happy.

Going to church is no more a crutch than, for example, going to a Karate studio to learn techniques for self-defense. The humble seek for instruction, the haughty follow their own will and we can see where that has lead our world today.²

Except I left out the first phrase: "As a Latter-day Saint (Mormon), I go to church..."

Well does that make you pause? What makes the difference between this person involved in a pagan cult and people involved at Clearcreek Chapel? Why does the true believing pilgrim gather to worship? This Psalm helps us...

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This question is asked in the midst of life as it is...

¹ The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The LORD is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

² When evildoers assail me to eat up my flesh, my adversaries and foes, it is they who stumble and fall.

³ Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war arise against me, yet I will be confident.

Theology – Here is your God

The pilgrim's view of God is critical:

God is the light dispelling fear-causing darkness...

God is the fortress defending life-taking enemies...

Problem - Here is your situation

Disliked... Hated... Opposed... Attacked... Criticized...

Sound familiar? Do you feel this way? Maybe you don't. Maybe in this warm fuzzy season of advent the idea of enemies and adversaries is hard to imagine. Yet Jesus was threatened by those who, at His advent, sought to destroy Him.

We may not this kind of situation, but most of us have issues and problems in our lives. Sometimes these come because of a fallen world. Sometimes they come because of a chastening God. Sometimes they come because of wicked people. But all that comes is directed and orchestrated by the Lord God.

Response – Here is your response

Speaks here of his attitude. His theology controls his emotions. He will not fear and will be confident even when surrounded. He may be in danger, but he is not in the dark and he is well defended (v. 1).

"The secret of David's public confidence was his private obedience: he took time to fellowship with the Lord and get directions from Him. David knew that the most important part of his life was the part that only God could see, and this was one priority he would not negotiate." (Wiersbe, p. 109)

In What We Pursue

David actually expected to see the Lord. Remember, the Shekinah glory was behind the veil.

⁴ One thing have I asked of the LORD, that will I seek after: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD and to inquire in his temple.
⁵ For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble;

³ For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble; he will conceal me under the cover of his tent; he will lift me high upon a rock.

⁶ And now my head shall be lifted up above my enemies all around me, and I will offer in his tent sacrifices with shouts of joy; I will sing and make melody to the LORD.

Our Driving Purpose

David has a single-minded purpose that causes him to go to the tent of meeting. It gives shape and passion to his praying. It fuels his desire and his dedication.

He was committed to the assembly, not because of people, but because of God. He has a Godward focus in his going to the assembly. He wants to see God. He may see a pillar of fire hovering over an old tent. But he knows that beyond that outward form there is a glorious Presence. Because of that, he will go up day after day until all the days of his life are passed.

David sees beyond his own time into our time. Even beyond that, he sees into eternity. This is one of those places where the Psalmist is saying more than he knows or understands. He may have a hope of seeing God face-to-face one day. That dim hope he may have had is for us a promised surety. If you believe and bow to God, you will one day gaze upon the magnificent beauty of our God in the face of Jesus Christ.

God's Sheltering Protection

He found security in the tent of meeting.. There was a deep sense of being with God.

Our Responding Praise

His head is lifted up so he lifts up the Lord. This is the result of seeing the Lord.

What happens when you gather with God's people? Are you so committed that being with God's people becomes a permanent place of protection where you praise God? What does it take to keep you from gathering with God's people?

In How We Worship

The response of prayer here is the result of hearing God. We seek God because He tells us to.

⁷ Hear, O LORD, when I cry aloud; be gracious to me and answer me!

⁸ You have said, "Seek my face." My heart says to you, "Your face, Lord, do I seek."

⁹ Hide not your face from me. Turn not your servant away in anger, O you who have been my help. Cast me not off; forsake me not, O God of my salvation!

> ¹⁰ For my father and my mother have forsaken me, but the LORD will take me in.

Our Highest Pursuit

Our worship engages God. This is not some mystical, inner vision or voice. It is the simple reality that He loves to be *with* His people.

We lift our requests to the Lord. We want to be heard, not just in our prayers but in our praises.

We choose our response to the Lord. We believe what He says about seeking Him and respond by seeking Him.

God invites us to seek Him and we respond by seeking Him. Neither in David's day nor in ours do we expect a *physical* manifestation of that engagement. We seek Him by faith and by faith we believe that He responds.

Our Deepest Concern

Our worship of God sometimes brings great comfort. It also brings great fear and awe. In fact, it should bring reverence - maybe even fear that we have offended such a God as ours. Sometimes our sin is the problem. Sometimes our low view of God is the problem. But it should matter a lot to us whether we have the smile of our heavenly Father.

Our Greatest Comfort

This is the sense of *being received*. He will assemble with us. Though forsaken by the closest of human relations, we will not be abandoned by our heavenly Father. We may be an earthly orphan but God opens His home and takes us in because of Jesus. He does not leave us as orphans, but rather has sent us His Spirit so that we may be recognized and respond as true sons.

What happens when you come to church? Do you actually worship God here? Do you sometimes tremble because of Him? What does it take to keep you from this place?

In What We Learn

Even in David's day, one of the reasons to go to the tent of meeting was to learn. He came prepared and expecting to learn. Do you?

> ¹¹ Teach me your way, O LORD, and lead me on a level path because of my enemies.

¹² Give me not up to the will of my adversaries; for false witnesses have risen against me, and they breathe out violence.

¹³ I believe that I shall look upon the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living!

> ¹⁴ Wait for the LORD; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the LORD!

Notice that this is verbalized in a series of requests. This is what we expect to learn. So we ask God to teach us these things. We want to be instructed in:

God's Paths

The word *way* refers to the *way* God is. As a result of knowing what God is like, we can know His paths. We need to be on those paths for on other paths, evil lie in ambush.

God's Protection

God defends us in the midst of the attack and the false accusations. It is not His intention to prevent that from happening; but to protect us from their desired consequences.

God's Provision

There can be no despair when we believe that God is going to show His goodness. Sometimes, God shows His goodness through the grace in one who is suffering. Witness the martyrs.

Reflect and Respond

In the light o all this, here is the exhortation:

Wait on the Lord

The root of this word means *to be bound together*. Being bound to the Lord, we patiently wait for Him to move on our behalf.

Be Strong

The root of this word means *to fasten upon*. Our strength comes from our connection to the Lord.

Take Courage

The root of this word means *to be alert, to watch*. Our courage comes from an awareness of the Presence and Power of God.

We too often have low expectations when we come to church. We are not expecting to see God, hear from Him, tremble because of Him nor see His great goodness. Often, this is simply because we are here for ourselves.

The strength and courage we have in the midst of pressure and accusation comes from our vital connection with God. This connection is maintained by our corporate fellowship with God.

Why are we so surprised at the mounting pressure against God's people? I believe it is good for us. Maybe in the midst of persecution we will see again God's power.

Do you come to behold our God, to worship the Lord and to learn what our God is like?
