# Worship Guide

Preparing for Public Worship: Part 7 The Diet of the Christian: Doing All Unto Him

E HAVE DISCUSSED IN THE PAST MANY WEEKS what it means to have a spiritual "diet" in the Christian life. We have seen the connection of our daily practices, the decisions we make, the way we think, act, pray, read, study, sing, and grow to the practice of public worship. We have not only discovered that there are a myriad of ways to prepare ourselves beyond devotions, and we have seen what fruit can become of our efforts. We have also discovered that our flesh has a unique tendency to undermine our efforts by drawing us towards idols, our selfish desires, and the world and work around us. Indeed, we groan for the day our flesh can be remedied by the ultimate resurrection of the dead.

Next week we will conclude this look at the diet of a Christian by seeing how we can prepare ourselves for extraordinary worship with ordinary tasks. Some of us have retired, others work full-time, others have trades, unique positions, and even our children and youth have things that the Lord has set apart for them to accomplish. Some of us may be in school, and some of us have children in the home. Whatever the case may be, the Lord doesn't cease to give us tasks at some particular moment: we are running a race until the finish (I Cor. 9:23-25). This includes our ordinary lives.

There are no hidden secrets to success in the real world, but if our work isn't religious, the contaminations of this world abound in our spheres of influence. The world is utterly occupied with the ways in which it can succeed, even if it means cutting corners, undermining other's success, evading obligations, lying to one another, or being unreliable. We must be ever-mindful of these temptations, because each day we are bombarded with these temptations in advertising, in our human resource departments, in our paychecks, in our crafts and products, in our daily speech. The problem is that the world is utterly consumed with the idea of selfish ambition, the kind that is void of all ethic, or only concerns itself with ethics which promote that selfish ambition. It is further confused because there are many with wealth, people who are incredibly influential in modern politics, business, and finance, who are all independently wealthy who dare not to utter the word "God" or "godliness" in their business plans. They are frequently encouraging anyone to "do what they do to get rich, success, fame, fortune."

"For this is the will of God, that by doing good you should put to silence the ignorance of foolish people" (I Pet. 2:15).

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### The Reading of the Law

Exodus 20:14; Leviticus 20:10-13; James 2:11; Mark 9:47

You shall not commit adultery.

If a man commits adultery with the wife of his neighbor, both the adulterer and the adulteress shall surely be put to death. If a man lies with his father's wife, he has uncovered his father's nakedness; both of them shall surely be put to death; their blood is upon them. If a man lies with his daughter-in-law, both of them shall surely be put to death; they have committed perversion; their blood is upon them. If a man lies with a male as with a woman, both of them have committed an abomination; they shall surely be put to death; their blood is upon them.

For he who said, "Do not commit adultery," also said, "Do not murder." If you do not commit adultery but do murder, you have become a transgressor of the law.

And if your eye causes you to sin, tear it out. It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into hell.
