# He Heard My Voice (The Prayer Warrior's Anthem) Psalm 18

Reading: Ephesians 6:10-20 (or 6:18-20)

Bethany Baptist Church December 31, 2017 July 19, 2014 ...pray...

The last time we examined Ephesians, Paul's letter was almost over.

The closing section of Ephesians examines spiritual warfare...

...and ends with some closing instructions on prayer ( $\rightarrow$  to enter the battle with prayer, to pray hard for your church & to pray hard for your spiritual leaders).

This morning I'd like to apply the connection between prayer & spiritual warfare by visiting one of my fav psalms.

(Call centers...service desks. You feel good about calling those places?

Long "call waits" (you are call number 42; please hold for the next available service rep)

Automated information gathering (you have 5 seconds to say or enter your 16 digit serial number)

Multiple transfers (please wait some more while I transfer you to our backline support group)

Strange accents (we won't even go there)

Dropped calls ( → start over!)

No help (sorry, that version is no longer supported)

Aren't you glad that prayer always works & that God's response time is always perfect!)

#### Turn w/ me to Psalm 18. Read Psalm 18:1-3

Psalm 18 is the *fourth* longest of the psalms (**50** verses)!

The *superscript* is lengthy & informative:

The *author* is David.

The *occasion* is the defeat of David's enemies, particularly (not exclusively) *King Saul*.

**Psalm 18** was written to be *sung* by a *choir*.

So I like to think of it as an anthem - a prayer warrior's anthem!

David's theme is simple: a hymn to the God who answers prayer.

Psalm 18 is like a *sandwich*: on either end of the hymn is a *brief* but *passionate* exclamation of devotion to the LORD. →

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vv.1-3 ... I love you, O LORD, my strength! vv.46-50 ... The LORD lives, & blessed be my rock!
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In the *middle* (vv.4-45) is the long account of *David's desperate prayer* for deliverance & the *record* of God's *answer*.

This is one of my favorite psalms because of its *intense & graphic images* of God's *answers* to our *cries*.

In the time we have, we **can't** thoroughly *explore* every detail of David's long psalm, but I want to *survey* its highlights & *draw out* some prayer pointers.

**Ten lessons on prayer** from the man after God's own heart.

- 1. God wants to be your *first line of defense* (vv.1-3; introduction)
- 2. God *hears* your prayers (vv.4-6).
- 3. God *answers* your prayer with *passion* (vv.7-15).
- 4. God is *stronger* than your enemies (vv.16-19).
- 5. God has *regard* for your faithfulness (vv.20-24).
- 6. God gives *grace* when the *humble* cry out (vv.25-29).
- 7. God keeps those who place themselves in His care (vv.30-36).
- 8. God *ignores* the prayers of the wicked (vv.37-42).
- 9. God can turn your situation completely around (vv.43-45).
- 10.God gets the complete credit (vv.46-50; conclusion).

### God wants to be your first line of defense (vv.1-3; intro).

- 1. What a great way to introduce this powerful & encouraging piece! Listen again to the rescued David's declaration of love and complete dependence "I love you, O LORD, my strength."
  - a. David immediately reveals that *love for God* & *faith in God* always go *hand in hand*... *faith* is a key component in the arsenal of the *prayer warrior*.
- 2. Do you remember from Eph 6 that prayer is a vital tactic in *spiritual* warfare...? David deploys **seven** military expressions (2) to describe the *strength* of God, who is the fugitive's *refuge* in desperate circumstances.
  - a. Rock Concealment
  - b. Fortress Protection & base of operations
  - c. Deliverer Rescuer (God, and why we petition Him)
  - d. Rock (2) Unshakable
  - e. *Shield The soldier's defensive weapon* (Eph 5 *shield of faith*)
  - f. Horn OT symbol of strength
  - g. Stronghold David knew the wilderness strongholds & ran to them
- 3. So David *ran* to God like a *prayer warrior* running for a fortified *bomb* shelter!
- 4. Prayer lesson #1: God needs to be your first line of defense.
  - a. Why try to *fight* your battles or *fix* your problems **w/o** Him when He so clearly describes Himself as a *fortress & deliverer* for His beleaguered children?

### God hears your prayers (vv.4-6).

- 1. David now begins to review the *reasons* for his confidence in God's strength. If you read carefully, you notice that the psalm has moved from its *present tense* introduction to a *past tense* report.
  - a. The point is that David's *confidence* is built on God's *history* of proven *responsiveness* & *faithfulness*.
- 2. David's situation had been desperate & prolonged. King Saul was *jealous* & *malicious* & *capricious* & *persistent* in his pursuit of Jesse's youngest son.
  - a. **Vv.4-5** repeat & emphasize just how dangerous David's predicament really was: *cords & torrents & snares...death & ungodliness*.
  - b. *Spurgeon* points out that the situation was so bad that the young man who had run **at** the *giant Goliath* with taunts ran **from** the *madman Saul* in terror (v.4)!
- 3. But David knew what to do (and it had little to do w/ a *sword* or *slingshot*!): "I called upon the Lord & cried to my God for help."
- 4. Which brings us (6b) to our **second** *lesson* in prayer from the *distress* of David. Very simply (prayer lesson #2): *God hears your prayers* (**read 6b**).
  - a. Prayer is not in *vain*. Prayer is not an emotional *placebo*. Prayer is not "*all in your mind*."
  - b. God, in heaven, *hears* the voice of His children!

Pray! Perhaps the situation seems desperate! Cry out! God hears your prayers!

# God answers your prayer with passion (vv.7-15). His passion – not yours!

- 1. This, perhaps, is my *favorite* portion of Psalm 18! David is still recounting the *reasons* he loves & depends on the LORD.
- 2. You might think that the God who is *all powerful & all knowing & all ruling* doesn't need to get in a *hurry* about anything. That *wasn't* David's experience.
- 3. David's cry was *desperate* and the LORD's response was *urgent* → *passionate*!
  - a. Notice, v.7, "then" → the moment God hears David's cry (v.6) He springs into action. God never puts you on hold! He never waits for a free moment to answer your text!
  - b. The earth below the heavens *rocked* in response to God's *offended* anger at the mistreatment of His child (v.7).
  - c. God's anger is pictured as smoking nostrils & a devouring breath of fire.
  - d. God *flew* as fast as the wind to David's rescue & He brought along an *angelic escort*.
  - e. God *cried out* in the storm & *fired* His artillery in the hail & lightning; the *result* on David's foes was devastating.
  - f. God's angry cries *laid bare* the underpinnings of the world! *Nothing is hidden from God's sight*!
- 4. David's *poetic imagery* is powerfully instructive.
  - a. Does God really have nostrils & mouth & feet & voice & breath? (no)
  - b. Does God actually need *cherub* to ride or *darkness* to hide? (no!)
  - c. But David's point is colorfully clear...!
- 5. **Prayer lesson #3**: When your situation is *desperate*, God answers with *passion*, not *passivity*. Don't you just *love* it...!
  - a. V.6 He heard my voice out of His temple.
  - b. **V.9** He bowed the heavens also, and came down!

### God is *stronger* than your enemies (vv.16-19).

- 1. In **1 Sam 24&26** we read that Saul *pursued* David in the wilderness, leading a force of **3000** *chosen men* of Israel. David, by comparison, led a band of **600**.
  - a. Do the math: David was outnumbered 5:1!
- 2. Not only was Saul's force more *powerful*, Saul was *powered* by an irrational, evil *hatred*.
  - **a.** David simply admits (17) that they were too mighty for me!
- **3.** Yet *despite* the strength of the enemy, and on the *very verge* of apparent calamity, God *rescued* David.
  - a. Notice the varied vocabulary of *deliverance*: sent from, took me, drew me out, delivered me, my stay (→ security), brought me forth...
  - b. All of which that **911** action is fueled by this (19b): "He rescued me, because He delighted in me."
- 4. **Lesson 4** is *simple*, but please don't rush past it: *God is* stronger *than your enemies*.... Do you *believe* that? Are you *trusting* in that?
- 5. **OBTW** (before we move on): why did God rescue David? "Because He delighted in me."
  - a. Savor the fact that God delights in you 2X (after all, the gospel is so clear: God demonstrated His own love for you, in that while you were yet a sinner, Christ died for you; Rm 5:8).
  - b. What *greater* assurance do you need!

# As you pray, God has regard for your faithfulness (vv.20-24).

- 1. The *gospel of Jesus* is wonderfully clear: you are *justified by faith alone*, not by *tradition* or *ritual* or *works*.
- 2. So what do you do w/ **these** verses? The LORD has rewarded me according to my righteousness?
  - a. David is *not* writing about the basis of His *salvation*. We know from **Rm 4:6-8** that David understood the blessing of being *forgiven*. His own *future* moral failures would soon reinforce him the wonders of God's *forgiveness* & *grace* (documented in **Psalm 32**, **Psalm 51**)!
  - b. Yet in the *context* of **Psa 18** (+1 Sam) David was *innocent* of any *wrong-doing* against **Saul**, and protested this to Saul *more than once*.
  - c. Further, David was *righteous* in his repeated refusal to *stretch out his hand* against King Saul, the Lord's anointed ruler over Israel.
  - d. David was *righteous* in his faith that *God would deliver him* from his enemies & *deliver him* to the throne...in God's perfect timing.
  - e. So *righteousness* in Psa 18 is not *saving righteousness* but rather a *righteousness* that is *relative* to David's *relationships/circumstances*.
- 3. There is a connection between our faithfulness & God's responsiveness to our prayers. Consider both sides of this principle from the NT:
  - a. **James 5:17** The effective prayer of the **righteous** man availeth much. The righteous man experiences effectiveness in prayer.
  - b. **1 Peter 3:7** *You husbands, likewise, live w/ your wives in an understanding way...lest your prayers be hindered.* The man who is *sinful* in his relationships will experience *hindrances* to his prayers. Similarly, the unfaithful Christian *grieves & quenches* the Holy Spirit, who is *tasked* (Rom 8) with helping us in our prayers.
- 4. This, then, is our **5**<sup>th</sup> prayer lesson: God has regard for your faithfulness. Live **righteously** if you want to pray **effectively**!

#### God gives *grace* when the humble *cry out* (vv.25-29).

- 1. *God is just*. He treats men & women *justly*; as they *deserve* (**v.25**). This principle continues/expands the previous point that God *recompenses* according to *righteousness* (20-24).
  - a. David has *changed up* his *grammar* again! Previously the poet has written *about* God ( $3^{rd}$  person He). Now the writer humbly writes *to* God ( $2^{nd}$  person You).
- 2. Then David appears to address *a fundamental Bible truth* about how God relates to men & women. This principle influence *prayer success*!
  - a. **V. 27** For You save an **afflicted** people, But **haughty eyes** You abase.
  - b. Note the *contrasts: afflicted* vs. *haughty; save* vs. *abase*. The *haughty eye* looks **down** on others...
  - c. Sound familiar? Need a hint? How about this: God is opposed to the **proud** but gives grace to the **humble** (Prov, Jas, 1 Pet).
- 3. David then goes on to provide examples how God *saves* the *afflicted*...
  - a. **V.28** *illumination*. The familiar image of God providing the *light* we need (esp *spiritual illumination*) to follow His path.
  - b. **V.29** *vindication*. David's early life was set in the context of conflict. God gave him strength to run upon his enemy. One translation says *For by You I can crush a troop*! And God gave him strength for *surprise* or *escape* like a scene from a 21<sup>st</sup> century action drama, *I can leap over a wall*!

- 4. The *prayer lesson* in **vv.25 -29** is that *God has regard for the humble* (afflicted) as they pray i.e. He *cares* about their *prayers*.
  - a. Ten centuries later the apostle Peter still connected humility to prayer (1 Pt 5): God is opposed to the proud but gives grace to the humble, therefore humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time, casting all your anxiety upon Him, because He cares for you. "Humble yourselves" → "casting all your anxiety on Him" Why? "Because He cares for you"
  - b. Do you want *grace* (→ *God at work in your life*)? David endured *affliction*, & David *cried out* & David *humbly proclaimed* that *the LORD is my strength*.

# Prayer principle #7. God *keeps* those who place themselves in His *care*. (vv.30-36).

- 1. David continues building on the theme of *God's integrity*, begun in **v.25**.
  - a. God's dealings w/ men (*His ways*) are *impeccable*. There is no reason to *blame* God when disaster *strikes* not in the sense of accusing Him of *evil*. He **is** the Sovereign *Creator & Sustainer* of all, but in all things, He remains *blameless*.
  - b. God's word to us is tried. David is picturing a testing process. God's word has been tested & proven perfect by experience & by (other) Scripture. The psalms elsewhere claim, "Your word is more precious to me than thousands of gold or silver pieces."
  - c. The promise here is that you can trust God to *deal square* & to *guide straight*.
- 2. **Psa 18** now returns to its emphasis on God's *strengthening* when His children come into *harm's way*.
  - a. The language is again very *military;* much of it David has already employed.
    - i. The LORD is shield & rock.
    - ii. I.e., He comes to our *defense* when we are under *assault*.

- b. But the greater emphasis is on God's *equipping* us for *battle*. Does this remind you of the *spiritual warfare* & *spiritual armor* of **Eph 6**?
  - i. *The God who girds me w/ strength* (like buckling on *armor*).
  - ii. Makes my feet like hinds feet & sets me on high places. David spent a lot of time hiding & scouting & fighting in the rugged Judean wilderness. The Lord made David agile for desert guerilla warfare.
  - iii. He trains my hands for battle: the ancient soldier grasped sword, spear, bow, & shield. He grappled w/ his enemies in mortal hand to hand combat. David credits God even w/ the strength to bend a bronze bow
    - 1. A bent bow *stores energy* to catapult its arrow; a bronze of bow pictures a weapon that is humanly impossible to wield. Thus David needed to be *extremely strong*....
    - 2. Only God can give the *strength* (*grace*) for *spiritual* warfare!
  - iv. God secures me. In **v.35** David suddenly shifts again to **2**<sup>nd</sup> person address: "You." David is thanking God for upholding him by His right hand. **Psa 63:8** My soul clings to **You**; Your right hand upholds me.
- 3. Here, then, is our 7<sup>th</sup> prayer principle: place yourself in God's care.
  - a. You need God's *strength* & *equipping* ( = *grace*).
  - b. **V.30** recognizes that for God to help you, you must *place* yourself in *His care*. Beloved *come* to Him *cling to Him!*

### Prayer lesson #8: God *ignores* the prayers of the wicked (vv.37-42).

- 2. You can be grateful that God *ignores* some people's prayers! *Really*...?
- 3. **Re-read vv.41.** *Who is this...?*
- 4. As we come to this section of the **18<sup>th</sup> Psa**, David *recounts* the glorious days in which God *turned the tables* on his enemies.
  - a. The OT confirms that God often used David to *defeat* Israel's foes (enemies like *Goliath* & the *Philistines*).
  - b. In a *great reversal*, David relentlessly *pursues*, *consumes*, *shatters*, *subdues*, *routes*, *destroys*, *pulverizes* & *pours out* the very enemies which had once made his life *so miserable*.
- 5. In their *bitter demise*, *David's foes* were reduced to begging *David's God* to help them! What a *thought*!
  - a. *God's answer?* ... *No* answer *at all*! God remained *silent*! And David continued to *pursue* his enemies until they were all *defeated*.
- 6. Let's **re-read vv.40-41**. Here is another principle of prayer: God has **no** regard for the prayers of the wicked, until they genuinely repent.
  - **a. V.41** is emphatic look at it *carefully*! *They cry for help...Even to the Lord...He did not answer them!*
  - b. If a man is going to *oppose* God & *oppose* God's people, he can *drop* prayer from his *arsenal*!

# Prayer lesson #9: God can turn your situation completely around (vv.43-45).

- 1. The idea of *reversals* is a familiar theme in the Scriptures (e.g. Mordecai & Haman in the OT *Book of Esther*).
  - a. David is praising God for *reversing* his misfortunes.
  - b. Recall that David's men urged him to *strike down* Saul in the *cave* & in the *star-lit circle of the camp*.
  - c. David *refused* to take vengeance into his own hands, knowing that God had a *holy timeline* for keeping His promise.
- 2. **Psalm 18** reminds us that God *reversed David's misfortunes* as He took David from:
  - a. being pursued to pursuer.
  - b. ...from fearing to being feared.
  - c. ...from fugitive to king.
  - d. And as a result (43), "a people whom I have not known serve me!
- 3. Have you ever prayed in a situation that *looked completely hopeless*? That you were afraid would come to *no good end*?
  - a. That Ts-up this prayer principle: even when things look hopeless, pray! God is the God of incredible reversals! He can turn your situation completely around.

Out tenth & last prayer lesson is that God should get the complete credit (vv.46-50;  $\rightarrow$  conclusion).

- 1. We've come to the *concluding section* of Psalm 18 so we aren't surprised when it *bookends & echoes* the initial excitement of **vv.1-3!** 
  - a. We've gone from (1) I love the LORD, my strength, to (46) the LORD lives, and blessed be my rock!
  - b. Sandwiched in between v.1 & the end, God's *answers* to David's cries for deliverance have been *powerful* & *personal* & *passionate*.
- 2. David is careful about where the *credit* for his wonderfully reversed fortunes should go!
  - a. *God* is to be exalted (46).
  - b. It is *God* who executes vengeance (47).
  - c. [God] delivers & lifts above & rescues (48).
  - d. Even when David whirls the sling or bends the bow, he understands who gives strength & who guides the missile!
- 3. *Therefore* (49) David vows to give God the *thanks* & to *sing to God the praises His name evokes*.

- 4. So David's *warrior poetry* (Psa 18) provides each of us w/ a *note of assurance* and also our *concluding lesson in prayer*. When you *experience success*, **God gets the credit**. (Spurgeon points out that this idea is all over Psalm 18.)
  - a. When David & Saul returned together from the battle against the Philistines & the giant Goliath, the women of Israel sang this song: Saul has slain his thousands, but David his tens of thousands.
    - i. King Saul was not too keen on that!
    - ii. But here David points out that the *hand* that strengthened his hands & the *hand* that guided the stone to crack the skull of the bronze helmeted mega-warrior was none other than the hand of God Himself. ...prayer...
  - b. So, do you give God the credit in your conversations w/men?
  - c. And, do you give God credit in your conversations w/ God!
- 5. The next time your prayers are answered, give God the glory!
  - a. Which is exactly how David draws his anthem to a close: *I will sing praises to Your name! He gives great deliverances to His king, and shows lovingkindness to His anointed, to David & his descendants forever.*

Ten lessons on prayer from the man after God's own heart.

Here is a homework assignment to fortify your QT as the new year begins:

Incorporate **Psa 18** into your **QT** for the next **10** days, and focus on **1** section & **1** prayer lesson *per day*?

I love you, O LORD, my strength...The LORD lives, and blessed by my rock & exalted be the God of my salvation!

...pray... Thanks for answers & strength & thus Your faithfulness in 2017! Beg You for grace & guidance in 2018!
