2 distinctives

I. THE DESTINATION THAT IS ASSURED BY THE DIVINE PROMISE 8-12 A. IT IS PURSUED WITH A STUNNING PROMPTNESS 8, 9 1. His Immediate Departure 8a A sovereign summons, Gen 12:1-6. Preparing us for 15:6; Rom 4:3, 9, 22. Inheritance is central to the covenant. 812

2. His Implicit Dependence 8b Meaning of faith! Great perplexity, uncertainty, radical changes, etc., in the face of incomplete, incomprehensible details. Uncertainty and vagueness do not deter our faith and confidence in God.

3. His Inconstant Dwelling 9a Sojourner.. foreign land... tents. A sense of rootlessness; belonging to nowhere. Dt 26:5. Contrast = land of promise, land of Canaan. Here, strong hints of permanence, stability.

His custom. His company- covering the entire period of patriarchal sojourn in Canaan. His comfort? His confidence – language of promise constant assurance of God's reliability, Isa 65:16; etc.

B.IT IS PONDERED FROM THE SUPREME PERSPECTIVE101.His Eager Prospect10

His faithful focus and riveted gaze. His power, purpose for living. Foundations contrast with transient, temporary conditions. The foundation in tents; no stability in tent-living.

2. His Excellent Perception

Out of this world. Crafter and builder. Supernatural. Not merely seeking relief from mundane miseries. True meaning of inheritance. Expanded on in vv. 13-16.

2. The Covenantal Promise 11b The patriarchal resurrection is based on the promise/Word of God = the ground of his confidence, faith. Rom 4:18-19.

3. The Countless Progeny	12
Contrast of one (dead) man vs countless; etc. Recall Isa 51:1, 2; Jn 12:24; 1 Cor 15:36. Also	
15:5; 22:17; Ex. 32:13; Dt. 1:10; etc. Fulfilled in Mt 28:18-20; consummated in Rev 5:9; 7:9-1	2.
II. THE DETERMINATION THAT IS ANCHORED IN THE DIVINE PURPOSE	13-16
The patriarchal eschatological confidence. How is this determination demonstrated?	
A. BY ACKNOWLEDGING THEIR TRANSIENT CONDITION	13, 14
1. Their Delayed Acquisition	13a
Rev 14:13. Died in faith, not in frustration, futility, failure.	

2. Their Distant Affection Note their courageous confession. See Heb 11:25-27.

3. Their Defiant Acceptance A manifest declaration.

B.BY AFFIRMING THEIR TOTAL COMMITMENT15, 16A1.The Rejected Possibilities15

No nostalgia. The desire to return contradicts the powerful presence of faith. Christian life = a cruciform life, Lk 9:23-26; 14:25-27. Rejects all possibilities and pretensions to personal preferences that diminish, distract, deter, etc., our faith. Gen 24:1-7.

2. The Reaffirmed Priority 16a A defiant attitude. A continuous, insistent desire, cf. 1 Tim 3:1, forged on the eschatological promise. The nature of this home is developed in Heb 12:22-24; 13:14. An ardent focus and accepted fact. This world is not our home!

C. BY ATTAINING THE UTMOST COMMENDATION 16 B The grand climax of it all! The crowning crescendo of it all! 1. The Confirmation of Their Faith The divine confession and confirmation. Ex 3:6, 13, 15, 16; Heb 2:11.

2. The Certainty of Their Future Jn 14:1-6. In the end, Jesus is our destination! Jn 12:26; 1 Thess 4:17; Rev 21:22. 13b

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
