Mercy—To show mercy, to show compassion, extend help for the consequence of sin, as opposed to, to be hardened. The general meaning is to have compassion or mercy on a person in unhappy circumstances, to be pitied, obtain mercy, implying not merely a feeling for the misfortunes of others involving sympathy, but also an active desire to remove those miseries.

- F. Concerns for those gifted with mercy
  - 1. Becoming too emotionally invested and losing our joy (Rom. 12:8)
    - Cheerfulness—gladness
  - 2. Minimize the importance of truth and repentance (Matt. 9:13)
  - 3. Easily hurt due to sensitivity (II Cor. 12:15)
  - 4. Short circuiting the purpose of suffering in someone's life (I Peter 1:6–9)
