Habakkuk 1:12-2:1

Trusting that God Is at Work

I. Determined Faith (v.12-13a)

¹² Are you not from everlasting,

O LORD my God, my Holy One?

We shall not die.

O LORD, you have ordained them as a judgment,

and you, O Rock, have established them for reproof.

You who are of purer eyes than to see evil and cannot look at wrong,

II. Difficult Questions (v.13b-17)

why do you idly look at traitors and remain silent

when the wicked swallows up the man more righteous than he?

14 You make mankind like the fish of the sea,

like crawling things that have no ruler.

¹⁵ He brings all of them up with a hook;

he drags them out with his net;

he gathers them in his dragnet;

so he rejoices and is glad.

¹⁶ Therefore he sacrifices to his net

and makes offerings to his dragnet;

for by them he lives in luxury,

and his food is rich.

17 Is he then to keep on emptying his net

and mercilessly killing nations forever?

III. Diligent Patience (2:1)

¹ I will take my stand at my watchpost

and station myself on the tower,

and look out to see what he will say to me,

and what I will answer concerning my complaint.

1. Launching Question(s):

• What are some typical ways that this world responds to terrible events and tragedies? How is the church of God meant to look different than this?

2. Observation Question(s):

- Read Habakkuk 1:1-11. What has happened so far? How did the Lord respond to Habakkuk's first questions?
- Habakkuk begins this second dialogue with several statements recounting God's character.
 Why does he begin with these statements instead of launching right into his questions?

- What are the questions that Habakkuk brings before the Lord about Israel's situation? What might these questions look like when applied to Christians today?
- What should we learn from the end of Habakkuk's questions in 2:1? How is his patience described?
- Given Habakkuk's questions, what does it mean for the "righteous to live by faith" in Habakkuk's day (2:4)? How does this apply to being a Christian nowadays?

3. Interpretation Question(s):

- What does it mean that God is "of purer eyes than to see evil" and he "cannot look at wrong" (vs. 13)?
- What is the "Problem of Evil"? Have you ever struggled with this? What have been some doctrinal truths that have helped you deal with this issue?
- God has always worked in magnificent ways. How does the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ provide answers to the hardships in this world?

4. Reflection Question(s):

• Which one of these three aspects of trusting the Lord's work (faith, questions, and patience) do you need to grow in and why?
