## **Introduction and review.**

## II. Jesus speaks in parables. v. 4-10

- A. What is a parable? An earthly story with a heavenly meaning. 4:23 5:36 6:39 7:41-43
  - 1. Parables usually illustrate one particular spiritual truth.
  - 2. Understanding this first extended parable is crucial. Mark 4:13
- B. This parable paints a familiar picture for the original hearers. v. 4-8a
  - 1. This is how agriculture operated in ancient Palestine.
  - 2. The Old Testament also uses agriculture as a teaching illustration. Isa. 55:10-11 Hos. 2:23 Jer. 31:27 4:3-4 Co. 1:6 Acts 6:7 John 15:2
- C. Jesus uses parables both to reveal and to conceal the truth. v. 8b-10
  - 1. The parables reveal the mysteries of the kingdom to those who have ears to hear. v. 8b-10a 10:23-24 14:35 18:34 Mt. 13:16 Jo. 20:29 Is. 54:13 1 Co. 2:7 Eph. 1:9
  - 2. The parables conceal the mysteries of the kingdom from those who do not have ears to hear. v. 10b Mark 4:34 Mt. 13:14-15 Isa. 6:9-10
  - 3. God sovereignly reveals and conceals. v. 10 Mt. 11:25 13:12,14-16 John 9:39
    - a. The Holy Spirit enables us to understand God's Word, which is foolishness to those who are perishing. 24:44-45 10:22 1 Cor. 1:18 2:14 Mt. 16:17 Jo. 6:44
    - b. The Lord hardens those who are under His judgment. Ro. 1:18ff 9:15ff
  - 4. Jesus' mission is like that of Isaiah. v. 10b Isa. 6:8-10
    - a. Both are sent by God to a hardened people. Isa. 6:8 1:2-3 3:12-26
    - b. Jesus, like Isaiah, is rejected by His own people. 4:24 7:30 John 1:11
    - c. God judges the hard by making them harder as they hear His Word. Isa. 6:9-10 John 12:37-40 Acts 28:26 7:41,51 13:46-47 Ro. 1:24ff
    - d. Those who cannot understand only have themselves to blame. 7:30-34,39 6:11 John 3:19 9:39-41 Ex. 8:15 14:8 Pr. 1:22 Acts 7:51-53
    - e. As in Isaiah's day there is hope -the hardening of the nation does not preclude the fulfillment of God's promise. Isa. 1:21-26 7:14 9:1-7 11:1ff 40:1ff
  - 5. The parable of the soils illustrates how all parables work. 2 Co. 2:15-16

# III. There are four kinds of hearers. v. 11-15

- A. Jesus explains the parable. v. 11
  - 1. The seed is the life-giving Word of God the gospel of the kingdom. 1 Pe. 1:23
  - 2. Who is the Sower? 4:43 9:1-2 10:1ff Mt. 13:37 28:18-20 Acts 1:8 Eph. 2:17
  - 3. The soils represent different human responses to God's Word.
- B. Do you have a hard unresponsive heart? v. 12
  - 1. Some hearers are never affected by God's Word. Ps. 95:8 Pr. 28:14 Dt. 10:16 2 Ki. 17:14 Jer. 7:26 Neh. 9:29 Mt. 21:33ff
  - 2. Satan (the devil) is actively doing all he can to prevent people from hearing and believing the Word. 22:3-4 7:30 1 Pe. 5:8 2 Co. 2:11 4:3-4 John 8:44 Gen. 3:1ff
  - 3. God's purpose is the opposite of the devil's. v. 12b 7:50 Ro. 10:9 2 Pe. 3:9
  - 4. The problem is not with the seed or the Sower, but the soil.
- C. Do you have a shallow weak heart? v. 13
  - 1. Some who initially respond to God's Word with great enthusiasm fall away (depart) when trials occur. Heb. 3:12 1 Tim. 4:1 Jo. 6:66

- 2. Many professing Christians are unprepared for the hardships of discipleship. 9:23ff 12:51-52 2 Tim. 3:12 1 Pet. 2:21-23 1 Jo. 3:13 John 6:66 Mark 4:17
- 3. Is Jesus saying that people can lose their salvation? <u>1 Jo. 2:19</u>,3-4 1 Co. 10:13 John 10:28 8:31 Mt. 7:21-23 Phil. 1:6 Js. 2:14-17 Ro. 8:31ff 1 Pe. 1:6-7
- 4. Only those who endure are genuine. Jo. 8:31 1 Pe. 1:4-7,23 Mt. 24:13 1 Jo. 2:19
- D. Do you have an infested divided heart? v. 14
  - 1. These people also initially respond to the Word, but their interest is choked out by worldly cares. Mark 4:19
  - 2. Jesus makes it plain that His disciples can't have it both ways. 16:13 17:32 11:34 16:19 1 Jo. 2:15-17 Js. 4:4 1 Tim. 6:9-10
  - 3. Those who are double-minded are unfruitful and ultimately fall away.  $12:13-\underline{34}$  18:18-24 21:34 2 Tim. 4:10 3:4 Js. 1:8
- E. Do you have a true responsive heart? v. 15 8:3,21 7:44-47
  - 1. The same word which produced no lasting results in the first three types of soil is very fruitful when it is planted in good soil. Isa. 55:10-11
  - 2. Characteristics of those who have genuine faith. 1 Thess. 1:2-10
    - a. They hear and accept the Word. Mark 4:20 Mt. 13:23 Acts 17:11 Deut. 6:4ff
    - b. They persevere through trials. 21:19 1 Pe. 1:6-9 Acts 13:43 14:22 Ro. 5:3-4 Rev. 1:9 2:2,19 3:10 13:10 14:12 Heb. 12:1ff
    - c. They are very fruitful. 10:28 John 15:1-8 Col. 1:6,10 Gal. 5:22-23 Mt. 3:10
  - 3. What is the difference between these people and the others? 6:43-45 10:42 23:50
    - a. From the perspective of human responsibility, these people have true hearts which choose to receive the Word, persevere in faith and bear fruit. 6:43-45
    - b. From the perspective of divine sovereignty, the Lord draws and keeps them. John 6:44,37 1 Pe. 1:3-5,23 Eph. 2:1ff 1 Co. 3:7 4:7 Rom. 3:10ff Isa. 53:6

### IV. Concluding applications: What are we to take away from this parable?

- A. Jesus teaches us about the nature of His kingdom.
  - 1. The kingdom of God is breaking into the world through Jesus we are in an exciting season of sowing and reaping.
  - 2. Don't be surprised when many reject our message. 2 Co. 2:15-16 Ps. 119:136
  - 3. The kingdom is producing a remarkable harvest of souls in spite of the opposition of Satan and the hardness of men's hearts. 10:2 Isa. 55:10-11
  - 4. Keep sowing the Word. 10:16 1 Co. 9:16 3:7 Gal. 1:8-9 2 Pe. 3:9 1 Pe. 1:23
  - 5. Be careful not to give false assurance not all who respond are truly saved.
