Stewarding God's Kingdom – Lessons from the Parable of the Talents Matthew 25:14-30

1. What are we called to Steward? (Every part of our life is a gift from God)

Spiritual Capital

- What does it mean to steward God's kingdom?
- Do you believe that God owns every area of your life (including time, talent, treasure, relationships)?
- How do you respond in times of unbelief and doubt about your faith?
- Are there areas in your life where you feel discontent?
- Where do you misplace your identity? What are consequences of finding identity apart from Christ?
- How is your prayer life? What about reading God's Word?
- Are you consistently living a life that is responsive to the Holy Spirit, seasoned with the grace of Jesus and trusting in your good Heavenly Father?

Human Capital (time and abilities)

- How do you spend your time?
- Does your life seem busy or hurried?
- How do you handle interruptions in your schedule/agenda?
- Are you using your abilities, education, experience and knowledge for kingdom work?
- Do you see your school, job, parenting, or retirement as a platform for kingdom work?

Financial Capital (money)

- Do you consistently and sacrificially give money to Kingdom causes? Why or Why not?
- How have you curtailed your normal spending or saving to be more generous?
- Does your giving produce joy, or regret and guilt?
- How much money is enough?
- What motivates you to give? To save? To spend?
- Is your work (ability to make money) your identity and security and where you find value?

Relational Capital

- What are your desires / hopes / dreams for your children?
- Are you more concerned with your child's happiness, comfort and safety than their holiness, faith and pursuit of Gospel risk taking?
- Are you overly dependent on the approval of others, or do you simply not care about others?
- How often do you "use" people for personal gain?
- Are you consistently involved in the discipleship and care of those around you and do you point them to Christ in your words and actions?
- Are you a good and faithful, listening friend that people come to for prayer and counsel?

Emotional Capital (hurt, grief, anxiety, trials)

- Do you see trials as opportunities for stewardship?
- Do you blame (or get angry) others, or circumstances, or God when life gets hard?
- Are you emotionally cool or overly dramatic towards others?
- What areas of your life cause the greatest stress/fear?
- When you experience grief how do you respond?

2. What does Stewardship look like?

- The Call vs 14 We are His and He has a plan for our lives.
- The Entrusting vs 14 & 15 We receive different amounts according to our abilities. (One way we find God's will for our lives is through our limitations and potential.)
- The Time vs 19 Our master gives us time and we are held accountable; so long term, consistent perseverance is a must.
- The Return vs 16, 17, 18, 27 Risk (faith) is always involved, but even a little interest is OK.
- The Kingdom partnership vs 21, 23, 28-29

3. What are the results?

- Stewardship glorifies our Master, not us (vs 21 & 23)
 - o Results "Well done"
 - Method "Good" at growing the master's kingdom.
 - Motivation "Faithful" purpose in life was to serve his master.
- Stewardship reveals our sin
 - o Blame the Master vs 24 Who or what do you blame?
 - Live in Fear vs 25 What are you afraid of?
 - Run and hide from accountability and responsibility vs 25
- Stewardship always rewards
 - Slothful servant reward Loss (vs 28-29) and Judgement (vs. 30)
 - o Faithful Servant reward Joy (vs 21 & 23) and Abundance (vs 29)
