## PHILIPPIANS Joyful Partnership Lesson 1 Chapter 1:1-26

Apostle Paul, c. 61/62 AD

Philippi: Roman city (c. 30b.c.) located in Macedonia (upper Greece) Church planted in c.51a.d. (first church in Europe)

Paul's special relationship with the Philippian church: calls them his "joy and crown" 4:1
<b>BACKGROUND:</b> Acts 16:12-40 <sup>12</sup> and from there to Philippi, a Roman colony, which is a leading city of that district of Macedonia. We stayed in that city for a number of days. <sup>13</sup> On the Sabbath day we went outside the city gate by the river, where we thought there was a place of prayer. We sat down and spoke to the women gathered there. <sup>14</sup> A woman named, a dealer in purple cloth from the city of Thyatira, who worshiped God, was listening. The Lord opened her heart to pay attention to what was spoken by Paul. <sup>15</sup> After she and her household were baptized, she urged us, "If you consider me a believer in the Lord, come and stay at my house." And she persuaded us.
Paul and Silas in Prison <sup>18</sup> And she did this for many days. But Paul was greatly aggravated and turning to the spirit, said, "I command you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her!" And it came out right away. <sup>22</sup> Then the mob joined in the attack against them, and the chief magistrates stripped off their clothes and ordered them to be beaten with rods. <sup>23</sup> After they had inflicted many blows on them, they threw them in jail, ordering the jailer to keep them securely guarded. <sup>24</sup> Receiving such an order, he put them into the inner prison and secured their feet in the stocks. <sup>25</sup> About midnight Paul and Silas were <i>praying and singing hymns to God</i> , and the prisoners were listening to them. <sup>26</sup> Suddenly there was such a violent earthquake that the foundations of the jail were shaken, and immediately all the doors were opened, and everyone's chains came loose. <sup>27</sup> When the jailer woke up and saw the doors of the prison open, he drew his sword and was going to kill himself, since he thought the prisoners had escaped. <sup>28</sup> But Paul called out in a loud voice, "Don't harm yourself, because all of us are here!" <sup>29</sup> Then the jailer called for lights, rushed in, and fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. <sup>30</sup> Then he escorted them out and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" <sup>31</sup> So they said, " on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your household." <sup>32</sup> Then they spoke the message of the Lord to him along with everyone in his house. <sup>33</sup> He took them the same hour of the night and washed their wounds. Right away he and all his family were baptized. <sup>34</sup> He brought them into his house, set a meal before them, and rejoiced because he had believed God with his entire household <sup>40</sup> After leaving the jail, they came to Lydia's house where they saw and encouraged the brothers, and departed.

<sup>12</sup> Now I want you to know, brothers, that what has happened to me has actually resulted in the advance of the gospel, <sup>13</sup> so that it has become known throughout the whole imperial guard, and to everyone else, that my imprisonment is in the cause of Christ. <sup>14</sup> Most of the brothers in the Lord have gained confidence from my imprisonment and dare even more to speak the message fearlessly.

<sup>5</sup> To be sure, some preach Christ out of envy and strife, but others out of good will. These do so out of love, knowing that I am appointed for the defense of the gospel; <sup>17</sup> the others proclaim Christ out of rivalry, not sincerely, seeking to cause me anxiety in my imprisonment. <sup>18</sup> What does it matter? Just that in every way, whether out of false motives or true, Christ is proclaimed. And in this I rejoice
