

MA to t kno The hea Isa An	Parables (which will be studied in chapter 9) are an example of this. Parables are given to us, but without the explanation of God, they are too high for us to understand. As such they represent a form of judgement of God upon or finite minds. Popular wisdom tells us that Parables were given to help us understand the Word of God. I can remember a very prominent preacher telling me. "Jesus was a man of His times. He would be walking the hi ways and byways of Galilee, look out over the countryside, make observations and then weave them into parables so that even the most common uneducated man could relate and understand the loftiest spiritual truth. We should strive to relate the Bible to twentieth century man in the same way!" Read Jesus' explanations of the use of Parables in the passage below AT 13:10 & 11, 13 & 14 And the disciples came and said to Him, "Why do You speak them in parables?" And He answered and said to them, "To you it has been granted to ow the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been granted erefore I speak to them in parables; because while seeing they do not see, and while aring they do not hear, nor do they understand.
