Testimony Time

1 Timothy 1:12-16

Amazing Grace

- ❖ The hymn, *Amazing Grace*, has been an enduring staple of Christian worship for over 250 years
 - worldwide fame
 - a favorite of Hollywood, politicians and causes of every kind
- ❖ Updated words?
 - God's grace does "save and strengthen", but that is not Newton's point!
 - when Newton writes: "That saved a wretch like me," Newton is identifying himself with the worst of sinners
 - a slave trader, blasphemer, rebel, immoral man, torturer who is as far from grace as anyone can be
 - "I sinned with a high hand, and I made it my study to tempt and seduce others."
 - because of God's amazing grace, the Lord broke through and changed Newton's life in 1748
- ❖ Newton realizes and confesses the desperate need sinners have for a Savior
- ❖ God's grace IS amazing BECAUSE it saves wretches

Paul's Personal Testimony

- ❖ Paul's testimony is packed with wonder and gratitude for his personal experience of God's grace
 - 1 Timothy 1:15 is the gospel in miniature
 - *Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost*
- ❖ Paul knows that those who serve the Lord need the Lord's enablement to do so
 - effective ministry is totally dependent on God's call and God's strength
 - the whole point of Paul's testimony is that he is UNWORTHY to receive God's grace
 - God makes Paul trustworthy
 - God makes Paul faithful
- ❖ How do you praise and thank God for the ministry opportunities He gives you within your family, the church, the world at large?
 - whatever role you have in life, it is a gift of God... a call from God
 - sometimes people grow ungrateful and tired of ministry

Saving Grace

- ❖ Paul knows that before God could use him as an Apostle, God needed to SAVE him
 - Paul's wretched past: *I was a blasphemer, persecutor, and insolent opponent*

- the murders for which Paul is responsible are all committed in the name of God, a fact that makes them all the more outrageous
- ❖ Christ came to Paul, and Paul came to Christ
 - Paul receives mercy and forgiveness
 - Ryken: “By the grace of God, the fiend became a friend.”
- ❖ **Ignorance and unbelief**
 - does not disqualify Paul from receiving mercy
 - does not make Paul less responsible for his sin
- ❖ God has mercy because God is merciful
- ❖ The overflow of God’s grace brings with it ***the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus***
 - every spiritual blessing there is comes WITH Jesus Christ
 - even our ability to believe comes from God

This is MY Story

- ❖ Paul’s personal testimony of God’s amazing grace is the spiritual autobiography of every Christian
 - Paul is **not** in a class by himself
 - every true follower of Jesus Christ receives what Paul received: mercy, grace, faith and love
- ❖ 1 Timothy 1:15 is the testimony of every genuine Christian who has ever lived

- ***The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost.***
- Paul invites us to line up with him, to put ourselves in his sandals, and count ourselves as the chief of sinners
 - you cannot receive God’s grace until you admit that you are a sinner (not used to be!)
 - growing in grace means that we will continually come to a deeper awareness of how depraved we are
- ❖ You will never understand how much God loves you until you understand HOW MUCH LOVING you need
 - there is no accumulation of sin that grace cannot overcome
 - the worst of sinners finds the greatest mercy and the most abundant grace in Jesus Christ
