The Gift & Freedom of Singleness

I. A Really Quick Overview of 1 Corinthians 7

- 7:1-7—Responding to asceticism: Get married and fulfill your marital duty.
- 7:8-9—To the unmarried and widows: Stay single like Paul, but if you burn, get married.
- 7:10-11—To the married: Don't divorce; if you do, either be reconciled or stay unmarried.
- **7:12-16**—To the married with unbelieving spouse: Stay married if they are willing but if they leave, let them go.
- **7:12-24**—To each one in the church: Don't feel that your earthly status needs to change when God calls you to be a Christian.
- 7:25-38—To the betrothed (virgins NIV): Remain as you are. The time is short (v. 29).
- **7:39-40**—To the widows: You are free to remarry if your husband dies but should only marry a Christian.

II. The Gift of Singleness (1 Cor 7:7)

- 1. Singleness is for some, not others.
- 2. Singleness is not some mystical or magical ability to resist sexual temptation and reject marriage.
- 3. The gift of singleness is a recognition that God has given the gift of celibacy for a season (or for a few, maybe a lifetime).
 - a. Not a status, i.e., single or married.
 - b. The gift = spiritually motivated for singleness, live a self-controlled life, and contentment with what God has given.

- 4. If you have the gift, you'll be content like Paul (Phil 4:11-13).
- 5. Some singles can choose to remain single for a season (or even a lifetime).
- 6. Some singles should get married.
 - a. Just because you "burn" (v. 9) doesn't mean you are *quaranteed* marriage.
 - b. If you struggle with sexual immorality then you are burning. Don't wait to "fix" the problem.
 - c. Contentment in singleness and an openness to marriage are not mutually exclusive.

III. The Freedom of Singleness (1 Cor 7:32-35)

- 1. Freedom from the troubles of marriage (v. 28)
- 2. Freedom from pleasing your spouse (vs. 33-34)
- 3. Freedom from having divided interests (vs. 35)
- 4. Freedom to be single (vs. 32-35; Matt 19:10-12)
- 5. Freedom to dedicate your life with singular purpose to God (vs. 32, 34, 35)

The Nature of Our Christian Relationships: Family-like Relations

"Do not sharply rebuke an older man, but rather appeal to him as a father, and to the younger men as brothers, to the older women as mothers, and to the younger women as sisters, in all purity." (1 Timothy 5:1-2).

- With care, concern, service and self-sacrifice.
- With interest and knowledge.
- With encouragement to grow spiritually.
- With love.
- With purity.
