1. The Angel of the LORD Comes with Gospel and Law (vv 1-2).

- A. Now the angel of the LORD went up from Gilgal to Bochim
 - 1) The Setting: Gilgal is where the covenant is renewed, and God comes down to bless His people (Jsh 5:9). Bochim is where the covenant is broken, and God comes to judge His people.
 - **2)** Who is the Angel of the LORD?
 - a) He is not a created being, but true and very God
 - i. The Angel of the LORD ascribes to Himself works of the LORD
 - **ii.** The Angel of the LORD ascribes to Himself words of the LORD
 - **iii.** The Angel of the LORD speaks as God, and not just on behalf of
 - **iv.** The Angel of the LORD prescribes and receives worship
 - **b)** He is the theophonic appearance of God the Son before the incarnation (Jn 1:18)
 - 3) The importance of the Angel of the LORD (Mal 3:1)
 - **4)** The Echo of Exile from Eden
- **B.** The Angel of the LORD bringing the Gospel
 - 1) I brought you up from Egypt (Ex 20:1-2)
 - 2) And brought you into the land that swore to give to your fathers
 - 3) And I said, I will never break my covenant with you (2 Tim 2:11-13)
- C. The Angel of the LORD bringing the Law
 - 1) And you shall make no covenant with the inhabitants of this land (Ex 23:32-33)
 - 2) You shall break down their altars (Ex 20:3-4
 - 3) But you have not obeyed my voice
 - 4) What is this you have done? (Gen 3:8-13)
- **D.** Uses from the Text
 - **1)** We must confess our sins to God.
 - 2) We cannot look to ourselves for salvation, for we have been unfaithful (Rom 3:23)
 - 3) We must look to the one who is faithful (I Jn I:9)

11. The Curse Is Pronounced Upon Israel (v 3).

- A. The Three-Fold Curse
 - **1)** I will not drive them out before you (Jsh 5:14; Gen 2:17; Heb 9:27; 1 Cor 15:26)
 - 2) But they shall become thorns in your sides (Num 33:55; Gen 3:18; Rev 21:8)
 - 3) And their gods shall be a snare to you (Rom 5:12; Rev 22:3)

- **B.** Uses from the Text
 - **1)** This is the cursed world in which the Church dwells (Eccl 2:24-26)
 - 2) Our hope cannot be this world (the land) but the Lord (I Cor 15:42-49)
 - 3) The Resurrection is to be our hope and encouragement (I Cor 15:58)

111. Godly Sorrow for Sin Leading to Faith in Christ (vv 4-5).

- **A.** Godly Sorrow for Sin
 - 1) Upon hearing the Word
 - **2)** True sorrow for sin
 - 3) Answering Objections from the Text
 - a) Objection 1: Why does true repentance begin with sight of and sorrow over sin?
 - **b)** Objection 2: Why don't I have a sorrow over my sin as I used to?
 - i. Because of the repetition of sins (1 Tim 4:2)
 - ii. Because of the lack of sight of the sinfulness of sins
 - iii. Because of the lack of sight of the holiness of God
 - iv. Because of the lack of sight of the seriousness of the Law
 - **v.** Because of the lack of sight of the gravity and torments of hell
 - vi. Because of the lack of sight of the goodness of the Gospel
 - vii. Because of the lack of sight of the purity and glory of heaven
- **B.** Godly Sorrow for sin leading to faith in Christ
 - 1) Naming that place (2 Cor 7:10)
 - **2)** Sacrificing to the Lord
 - a) The echo of the exile from Eden (Gen 3:21)
 - **b)** The Word has left us exposed before the omniscient holiness of God. (Heb 4:13)
 - **c)** We are like Adam and Eve in the Garden (Gen 3:7)
 - **d)** We need to be clothed in the righteousness of Jesus Christ (Lk 15:20-22a)
- **C.** Uses from the Text
 - 1) Do not delay in confessing and repenting from sin (Gen 4:7)
 - 2) Remember in the hour of temptation the suffering and sorrow brought about by sin.
 - 3) Look to Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sin (Rom 5:18-19)
