I. Introduction: God's eternity and man's transitoriness.

### II. God is eternal. v. 1-2

- A. He is the dwelling place for every generation of His people. v. 1
  - 1. He is our home and our place of safety. 91:9 71:3 Dt. 33:27 Isa. 4:6
  - 2. He is the only hope for frail fallen humanity. v. 3-12
- B. He is the eternal, self-existent Creator. v. 2 Ps. 9:7 41:13 Gen. 1:1ff
  - 1. He precedes all of creation.
  - 2. This attribute of God is set in sharp contrast to mankind's finitude. v. 3
- C. He is also immutable (unchanging in His character). v. 2 Num. 23:19 I Sam. 15:29
- D. Jesus Christ is eternal and immutable (and our home/refuge). John 1:1ff 14:1ff Heb. 13:8 II Co. 5:8 Phil. 1:23

## III. Mankind is transitory. v. 3-12

- A. Our life is fleeting. v. 3-6
  - 1. Dust is both our origin and our destiny. v. 3 103:14 104:29 Ge. 3:19 Ec. 12:7
  - 2. Even the longest human life span is but momentary. v. 4 Gen. 5:27 II Pe. 3:8
  - 3. The flood of death will overtake everyone. v. 5a
  - 4. You are like the grass which is sown, grown, mown and gone in a few short days. v. 5b-6 103:15-16 37:2 Isa. 40:6-8
- B. The cause of our mortality is our sin and God's wrath. v. 7-8 Num. 14:29
  - 1. Human death and decay is not "natural". Gen. 2:17 3:19
  - 2. The cause of death is God's just wrath against our sin. v. 7 Dt. 32:39 Rom. 5:12
  - 3. None of your sins escape God's notice. v. 8 Ecc. 12:14 Heb. 4:12-13 Mt. 10:26
- C. Come to grips with your mortality. v. 9-12
  - 1. Your life is marked by brevity and vexation. v. 9 Ecc. 6:12
  - 2. You are not likely to live more than seventy or eighty years. v. 10
  - 3. The days in this sinful flesh are toilsome. v. 10b
  - 4. Our accomplishments are fleeting. v. 10c
  - 5. God's wrath against man's sin is beyond human comprehension. v. 11
  - 6. The pains of physical deterioration and death are nothing compared to what awaits the lost after death. <u>II Thess. 1:7-9</u> Mark 9:48. Mt. 25:41 Rev. 21:8
  - 7. Pray that God will help us to understand the shortness of life. v. 12
- D. God, through His Son, has entered into our miserable transitory existence. John 1:14 3:16 Heb. 2:14-17 Rom. 8:3

# IV. God redeems us from our futility. v. 13-17

- A. Pray that God would turn from wrath and show mercy. v. 13 Ex. 32:12 Isa. 64:9
  - 1. Why should God turn? Only because of His covenant lovingkindness. v. 14
  - 2. Moses' hope was for a future generation which would enter the land. Num. 14:31
  - 3. We have a better hope in Christ.

- B. Jesus Christ has come to deliver us from the futility of death unto everlasting life.
  - 1. God's just anger against our sin has been turned away. v. 7,9,11 Heb. 2:17 I Pet. 3:18 II Cor. 5:21 Ro. 5:8-9
  - 2. He has defeated our great enemy, death, so that in Him we have eternal life. John 4:14 5:21,24 6:35,40ff 10:10 11:25-26 17:3 20:31 I Cor. 15:3-4,50-58
  - 3. Now our lives have meaning and purpose. Gal. 2:20 Phil. 1:21
- C. Pray that God would give us joy and satisfaction in Himself. v. 14-15
  - 1. Nothing in this decaying world will satisfy you!
  - 2. Only His lovingkindness brings joy which overcomes your sorrows.
- D. Pray that God would renew His majestic works for His people. v. 16 92:5 Isa. 40:5
- E. Pray that God would establish your life's work. v. 17,12 Deut. 28:12
  - 1. Many waste their lives, investing in what will be burned up. Mt. 6:19 II Pe. 3:11
  - 2. The only work which will last is the work of our eternal God. Mt. 6:19-21 Eph. 2:10
  - 3. Pray that God will help you to use your few days of life wisely. v. 12
  - 4. Be a good steward by planning your time like you budget your money. Pr. 21:5
  - 5. If you learn to number your days you will acquire wisdom. v. 12
  - 6. Your work is futile unless God grants success. v. 17 John 15:5 Ex. 33:15 Ps. 127
