The Kingdom of God

"There was something not right, something ultimately dissatisfactory and intolerable, about a world which was made, sustained, and "ruled" by God, but which nonetheless failed to acknowledge its Creator or give him his due." – STEPHEN WESTERHOLM

Paragraph #10 "The Kingdom of God" Kingdom Blessings Enjoyed:

We believe that those who <u>have been saved by the grace of God</u> through union with Christ by faith and through regeneration by the Holy Spirit enter **the kingdom of God** and *delight in the blessings of the new covenant*:

- the forgiveness of sins,
- the inward transformation that awakens a desire to glorify, trust, and obey God,
- and the prospect of the glory yet to be revealed. (Hope)

Kingdom Character Demonstrated:

Good works constitute indispensable evidence of saving grace. Living as salt in a world that is decaying and light in a world that is dark, believers should neither withdraw into seclusion from the world, nor become indistinguishable from it: rather, we are to do good to the city, for all the glory and honor of the nations is to be offered up to the living God. Recognizing whose created order this is, and because we are citizens of God's kingdom, we are to love our neighbors as ourselves, doing good to all, especially to those who belong to the household of God.

The Kingdom's Transforming Power:

The kingdom of God, <u>already present</u> but <u>not fully realized</u>, is the exercise of God's sovereignty in the world toward the eventual redemption of all creation. The kingdom of God is an invasive power that <u>plunders Satan's dark kingdom</u> and <u>regenerates and renovates</u> through repentance and faith the lives of individuals rescued from that kingdom. It therefore inevitably establishes a new community of human life together under God.
